Do we love Him? Will we let Him be Lord of our entire life? I know I let many things have control and


influence in my life. The Lord of heaven and earth, Jesus, has offered us the way of freedom and peace.

Christ is Risen!


He is Risen indeed. Alleluia!



Bible meals

Meals occupied a central place in Jewish life and Hellenic society. They were gatherings where eating was only an aspect of fellowship with opportunities for all sorts of communication, such as gossip, debates, recreation, teaching, learning and celebrating.

Hebrew - The *Berakah* was a domestic meal where the bread was blessed as a prelude to a family celebration. The *Chaburah* was a collegial meal, a fellowship among friends or associates. The sacrificial meals, where worshippers eat, offer to and thank God for his many mercies are called "Offerings of Wellbeing" (Leviticus 7:11-15 NRSV). They are mentioned in many parts of the Hebrew Bible: *Jacob & Laban* (Genesis 31:54), *Jethro & Moses* (Exodus 18:12), *Elkanah & family* (1 Samuel 1:3-5). Deuteronomy mentions two types of such meals: community meals (12:15) and meals at sanctioned altars (12:17-27). When the formal sacrifices and offerings at the Jerusalem Temple began to dominate Jewish life, the communal meals lost their original importance. Yet they retained an important function in some groups, such as Pharisees, Essenes and Christians.

Jesus - We know little about the meals of Jesus and his disciples, but Bruce Chilton suggests that they probably resembled the Jewish *Chaburah* except that the use of wine was prominent at his meals. He thinks that Jesus used wine to celebrate and anticipate the kingdom in the same way as the *Kiddush* had been used to anticipate and celebrate Passover. His meals may have started with an exchange of peace among the participants to establish the purity of the fellowship, after which Jesus would have raised the cup of wine in anticipation and celebration of the kingdom. His concept of purity was a state of divine fellowship, dependent on personal repentance and mutual forgiveness. His meals were a daily celebration of this purifying fellowship and were used to: (a) initiate people into his group, (b) maintain the purity of his community, and (c) celebrate the kingdom.

Bible - The New Testament uses 'meals' for a variety of different purposes: (a) meals that provide a setting for fellowship, debate and teaching; (b) meals used as metaphor to convey ideas; and (c) liturgical meals reflecting early Christian practices. The description of the 'Last Meal' in the New Testament indicates that we are dealing with varying liturgical models of early Christian communities rather than Hebrew meals or variations thereof that may have been used by Jesus and his disciples. A comparison of the structure of the Jewish Passover Meal with those of the Last Meal as described in the New Testament and the Didache shows a change in the use of the cup and the bread.

The practice of the early church changed the Jewish meal by 'shrinking' the structure and abandoning the first cup in favour of the last cup. The early Jerusalem community set the trend by adopting the common *Berakah* where the blessing of the bread was central to the meal (Acts 2:46). Only the writings of Paul and Luke still show an awareness of the old Hebrew model. Although the Didache, Luke's version and those described by Paul still show some evidence of the Jewish structure, the other examples indicate that the original order was abandoned in favour of breaking and blessing the bread first and retaining the final cup of thanksgiving as the important cup of the new covenant.

Eucharist - When the church became a national institution the liturgical last meal, the mystery of the Eucharist, became an exclusive instrument of the Church while blessings and thanksgiving at meals continued in households and small Christian communities. This distinction was accentuated during and after the Reformation when many Protestant groups and sects distanced themselves from the hierarchical Church and their liturgical practices, including the Eucharist. However, in whatever form the Eucharist may now be received, it remains a joyous event which needs to be celebrated. Happy Easter!






