One of my children, then in his teens, once joked "Mum, you have a Bible verse for everything!"



Gift Card Program The gift that keeps on giving

Those people standing at a table in the Narthex after service each Sunday are helping to raise money to keep the lights on in the church.

Pardon me!?!? How?

They are selling Gift Cards. When you buy a Gift Card from the church, you get the full value of the card and St. Paul's gets a percentage of the value. To date, the Gift Card program has earned about \$9,000, of which \$5,200 has been raised for St. Paul's.

The next time you go out for groceries, consider eating and helping the church at the same time. And you are not limited to groceries! For example, you can use the same PC card to buy gas at Refuel on Baseline at Merivale, as well as food at Loblaws or Your Independent Grocer and clothing or household items at The SuperStore.

Here's how it works: the church has bought the

cards at a discount. You pay the face value for the card; you get the full value on the card to buy groceries or whatever the store sells. The difference, our cost to your cost, goes to the church.

Farm Boy earns 5% (5.5% after returned empty cards are factored in.) Food Basics/ Metrro earns 4% PC / Loblaws earns 5% Sobey's earns 5%

If airmiles and point programs are a concern, please consider allocating say \$100 of your food budget to this program.

Community Breakfast update

Feedback from October 22, 2014

On October 22, as an important step in the process of identifying what new ministry we might consider undertaking, St Paul's hosted a Community Breakfast for 25 members of the Kanata community. These community leaders were invited to share their personal perspectives on the most significant needs currently facing our community.

Representation came from almost all sectors, including social and employment agencies, fire and police, arts and sports groups, business and retail, municipal politicians, and schools. This diversity lent itself extremely well to facilitated table discussion groups. Participants at each table were asked to identify, in their own opinion, the most significant need facing the community and what they would suggest to address it.

Various angles through which the participants approached the topic were observed and yet, even with these differing points of view, a number of similar issues emerged. Overall, ten "community need" categories, with associated suggestions, were identified. The most significant issues included seniors, youth, mental illness, the rapid urbanization of the community, and ease of access to existing community services and activities.

Here is a brief synopsis of the areas of need identified:

- Seniors (programs, activities, transportation)
- Adult/Parent Literacy and Numeracy
- Youth (programs, support, employment)
- New Canadians (integration)
- Community Safety
- Community Services (awareness and availability)
- Anxiety and Mental Health
- Community Change and Rate of Growth (rural/ urban, socio-economic gap)
- Affordable Housing
- Public Housing

The identification of these needs from an external, non-church perspective brings significant value to St Paul's journey of discernment. The data collected will be analyzed and integrated with our own, internal identification of needs which then will hopefully point to the most beneficial opportunities for us to consider.

We still have some way to go before this initiative becomes a reality. The parish will be consulted throughout this process and will ultimately approve, through Vestry, whatever ministry program is selected. Proposals for a new or enhanced ministry program will need to be developed, including a volunteer resourcing plan, a financial plan, an implementation plan, and a check-in with our community partners to ensure we are not duplicating any existing programs, and to ensure that coordination, if required, is properly established.

By late 2015 or early 2016, St. Paul's is looking forward to implementing a new ministry benefiting our community. In the meantime, you are heartily encouraged to get involved throughout this period of discernment. Ultimately, it will be up to the dedication and faithfulness of our parishioners to successfully promote and deliver this ministry to our community.



GIFT update Second Anniversary of our 5-year campaign

On November 23, the Feast of Christ the King, we celebrated the 2nd Anniversary of our 5-year GIFT Campaign. We give thanks to God for the generosity of our parish and the blessings that have come to our church, our community and our diocese.

Some highlights:

As of October 31, 2014, we have paid \$271,400 towards our target of \$300,000 mortgage reduction. At this point, we are on target to complete the mortgage repayment portion of GIFT by the end of 2014. This will bring our remaining mortgage to less than \$600,000, down from \$3.3 million in 10 years. God really does allow us to achieve more than we can ask or imagine!

Throughout 2015, we will honour our partnership commitment of \$50,000 with the Diocese. The Diocesan component is going towards meeting a variety of mission and ministry needs. Recently, the diocese gave a grant of \$25,000 to the new Ruddy-Shenkman Hospice located just up the road at the corner of Maple Grove and McCurdy Drive to help build a Reflection Room. Please take a look at the Diocese of Ottawa website for more info about GIFT.

Our half of that \$100,000 will be used to pay for the new roof (just under \$50,000) which was completed at this time last year. Replacing the roof wasn't in our original plan for GIFT, but thanks to the generosity of this parish, we were able to use GIFT Campaign funds to meet this unexpected need.

Part of our Case for Support in 2012 for the GIFT Campaign provided for a portion of our donations to either grow or enhance ministry and mission in St Paul's (this was the original intention of the \$50,000 split with the diocese). We identified 3 priorities for this money:

- seniors (specifically transportation),
- youth ministry, and
- facility upgrades (specifically, air conditioning for the hall).


We are now in a position to think about what added

or expanded ministry might look like.

In addition, we are blessed to have an additional \$41,000, so we have before us the fantastic problem of figuring out what to do with that. A first step in that direction was the Community Breakfast on October 22, which invited feedback from the community concerning areas of need that St. Paul's might want to consider for future ministry.

And there's more good news! We still have 3 years to go in our campaign, and we are less than \$10,000 away from \$500,000. It is not too late to be a part of this campaign. Christmas Eve1964 was a personal milestone in my life. Having turned eighteen three weeks earlier, I was confronted with the question that perhaps there was no Father Christmas. The excitement grew to frenzy as he gave each child a wonderful gift.

Now Father Christmas, being a jolly old fellow, continued to enjoy the festive ambience on the ship by attending the Christmas Eve Ball. As the evening progressed the impeccably dressed old man started to become disheveled... I discovered that his portliness was provided by a pillow and, horror of horrors, his white hair and beard were fake! His whiskers had moved around his head and were now situated under his left ear.

When ball was over, Father Christmas and his band of elves, me included, gathered near the swimming pool to continue imbibing in the festive spirit. Then, in a blink of an eye, Father Christmas disappeared, after giving a hearty "Ho Ho Ho."

Then, looking up, we saw perched on the railings of the deck above none other than Father Christmas. Staggering, he waved, shouted, and then jumped into the dark waters of the pool on the deck below, sending up a gigantic plume of white, salty water. Frantic moments went by, and then his wig and beard gently floated to the surface, to be followed shortly by St Nick himself, floundering in the cool salty water of the pool. The elves rushed forward and helped their leader out of the pool. I was shattered as I questioned in my own mind: who was this wet bedraggled man in a red suit?

The elves hastily placed the wig, beard and red hat on Father Christmas' head and then gently led him through the passages, down into the bowels of the ship to the crews' quarters, leaving a telltale trail of water.

I returned to my cabin, entering quietly so as not to wake my father, and there at the foot of my bunk was a mountain of gifts. The real Father Christmas had been! As I lay slightly intoxicated, yet contented in my bunk to know that there really was a Father Christmas, I believe I heard the Old Elf as he finished his rounds and left the ship shout out " Merry Christmas to all, and to all a good night!"



New hope for dementia patients and caregivers

Coconut oil can offer relief

It's currently expected that about half of the North American population will develop dementia as they age. Although regular vigorous mental and physical activity can delay and possibly halt onset, until recently there was little hope for those currently suffering. Most adults fear losing their mental faculties far more than they fear death, so any hope is exciting; particularly if it's safe, inexpensive and nonpharmaceutical.

The onset of dementia, including Alzheimer's, may be influenced by a number of factors: the effects of anesthetics, nutrient deficiencies, a lifetime of struggle with anxiety and/or depression and, as is now known, an inability for brain cells to utilize glucose effectively. Essentially, this is diabetes of the brain.

Brain cells are heavy users of blood glucose, but those with dementia seem often unable to process this abundant blood sugar. Happily, there is an alternate source of energy for these critical cells: Ketones.

Ketones are typically produced in the liver in response to fasting, to provide an effective energy source from body fat. In fact, putting epilepsy patients on a fast for a period of time is a medical option for epilepsy going back many decades. It is now known that therapeutic blood level of Ketones can quickly be obtained through the use of dietary medium chain fatty acids (MCTs), of which coconut oil is one of the best sources, being over 60% MCTs.

Coconut oil is unique in safety profile, health benefits, and its property of not causing weight gain since the MCTs are used so differently in human metabolism. If my parents were still alive and suffering from dementia, I'd first have their serum ferritin levels checked to ensure their iron levels weren't an issue, then start slowly with 1-2 teaspoons of coconut oil/ day, titrating up daily as tolerated to 6-8 teaspoons/day spread out over 3-4 doses. I'm very conservative, so I always prefer to add anything new step by step.

If not seeing a significant benefit within a couple of weeks, I would consider adding Equilib powder or capsules to provide the non-Ketone nutritional components in highly bio-available forms, titrating up to 4 capsules/meal as tolerated. Many years ago, a pilot program was done in a nursing home where this nutrient regime was administered for two months. The administrator's report was that anxiety and agitation levels and medication levels were reduced for many of their clients.

There are no magic bullets, and nothing will work 100% of the time for 100% of the people, but this seems a no-brainer; a high degree of safety, known health benefits, and a reasonable degree of hope for improvement.

It's not just the person with dementia who suffers. Their entire extended family does as well. As a practitioner, I've had a number of clients who hit a brick wall - trying to be everything to their parents, children, partners and co-workers. These emotions of stress, guilt and powerlessness can be overwhelming, and serve no useful purpose. They simply leave us spinning our wheels.

A number of tools, such as exercise, meditation and taking time out, etc, are highly beneficial. Unfortunately, for many, they're so stressed they can't even think about caring for themselves. When they come to me, I work with them to integrate Emotional Freedom Techniques, initially as clients, then as do-ityourself at home. These techniques typically defuse the powerful and crippling negative emotions as they arise, allow people to accept what they cannot change, and appropriately prioritize their resources without feeling anxious, overwhelmed and guilty.

Donation ornaments




