## St. Paul's Youth meet every other Friday

Every other Friday night from 7 to 9 p.m., the halls of St. Paul's are filled with a special kind of energy. By the dim light of the sanctuary, it is a remarkable sight when a dozen or so 9-14 year olds sit in perfect stillness and silence in the church pews... so they don't get caught during hide-and-seek.

It seems that the church has a certain appeal at night when everyone is gone and the lights are out. The youth are determined to explore every corner of the hall and sanctuary – of course, being careful not to disturb anything. Perhaps they feel like, for a brief time, it is *their* space, *their* church. Besides, what better place to hide than under the altar when playing hide-and-seek? It exudes a certain sense of safety and protection. It's one of those things that you can't quite do on a Sunday morning during the sermon.

In late September, we started off with a small group of youth and a handful of dedicated youth helpers from both the 9:15 and 11:00 services who may not have known each other very well. However, after just a few meetings, we have steadily grown. The youth (and helpers) are getting to know each other more, and look forward to seeing one another on Sunday morning. Connections are being formed. Friendships are developing.

Over the past couple of months, SPY group has gathered about 5 times to engage in games and fellowship. So far, we have worked on getting to know each other and having fun. We have focused on fostering those relationships that flourish in a relaxed and lighthearted atmosphere. As time goes on, we will begin to serve more together, finding places where we can make a difference in the lives of others and in the community. Coupled with more deliberate prayer and study, our hope is that, down the road, SPY group will become a place where the youth of St. Paul's will gather regularly to connect, serve and reflect.

So far though, the pool noodle hockey, the pumpkin carving, capture the flag (outside in the dark), cooking and eating a meal together, and packing Samaritan's Purse shoeboxes, among other activities, has successfully sprouted those seeds of connection. Or, per-

## **Being Mission Focused: Stop for the One**

I shared a talk at St Paul's on October 16, which ended up as part of a very special missions Sunday. Not only did I preach via the lectionary (flavoured with African lessons and experiences), but various members of St Paul's SchoolBOX outreach shared as well. We are all ordinary St Paul's people, learning to do extraordinary things for God. If you missed my talk, its available on waystogrowingod.org.

The SchoolBOX clan are looking forward to returning to Nicaragua and build a school in Fr. Rick Marples' name. Tony and I also are planning to be longterm missionaries in South Africa hopefully by the summer. But you don't have to go to Africa or Central America to reach out - although if you do go, it forces you to rely on God so you can minister to others more effectively. You trust God, since you are out of your comfort zone. However, if you reach out to others where you are, you are needed just as much. It's just that you have to intentionally step out of your comfort zone and trust God. Many of you praved for and supported Tony and I in Africa, and the team in Nicaragua. Some of you even had stirrings in your heart that you would like to do some sort of outreach, whether in Kanata, Ottawa, or further afield. But where does one start?

Not all of us feel called to volunteer with the homeless, although this is a great ministry for those who do. Others go into the prison to lead an Alpha course, or hold one in a seniors centre. We hope to



have one in our condo apartment this January. One way that all of us can reach out is to stop for the divine appointments that God brings our way. This little door of heaven can open up right in the middle of an ordinary day, and in your own neighbourhood. The world is in fact a 360 degree mission field. I will never forget my seminary missions professor telling me that. You don't have to be a professional, full-time missionary to love your neighbour. You can also look for opportunities to love within the church walls. Do you know your pew neighbours? Do you see someone you don't know? You never know how kind words and a touch may impact a life.

Heidi Baker (who co-founded Iris, the mission organization I joined as a Harvest School alumna) often says that we need to stop for the one. This is her way to describe a divine appointment. This is to STOP for the one that God brings you. This person could be anyone. The key I've discovered is that you sense a nudge inside you, and your fears fills with compassion towards that person. You just know that you know this is the person you are to talk to. This is the right one.

Yet, you don't always have to wait for this nudge. There are many obvious opportunities. You may see someone struggling with their grocery bags. You may see someone in obvious physical pain. They need practical help and prayer! People rarely say no, and you'll bring a touch of hope into their lives. You may even be asked why you're filled with love and joy, or they may remark about the peace that surrounds you. It's Jesus!

Many of the encounters Tony and I have had in South Africa, Mozambique and Botswana were appointments set up divinely- especially in Botswana, since that whole trip was an unexpected surprise on our part. Had we stayed longer at the time, these encounters could have led to deeper relationships. Here in Canada, we can be blessed by knowing these people better, because we live right here. Tony is continuing what we learned at the Iris mission school in his outreach here in Ottawa. Shortly before we

went to Africa, we downsized into an apartment condo in the Britannia neighbourhood. That opened up a whole new community to us, including the nearby Ritchie Street. We figure that it's an Ottawa equivalent to a South African township. We would like to visit people there. I'm also part of an outreach to help struggling families at Christmas. It's called Holiday Dream. Through this, I hope to do some home visits with those I sense a strong pull towards. Who knows where God could take this?

The key components are to allow God to love others through you, and to trust him to guide you. You don't need fancy words or a formula. Be you, and be willing to be humble. Don't rush. Heidi always says to "go low and slow." This means to be humble and take your time. The person before you is precious, as are you. The journey is a wonderful one, especially at Christmas. People are always more open than you think.

Pray about the opportunities as God opens doors for you. You don't have to go to Bible school or missions school to be active in your Christian faith. I pray you may experience this unique joy this season. I'd love to hear your stories as you step out. Have a blessed Advent and Christmas!

## 10 Bible verses to calm your anxious soul

In this life we have two choices. We can go along with the temperature of our environment letting our mind and emotions be led by the twists and turns of the ever-changing scenarios of life, or we can set our hearts and minds on something higher and stable for our soul. I'm choosing the latter.

Calming my heart and mind is a daily action and requirement for my soul to be at peace. Work requirements, relationships hiccups, and daily life stressors are inevitable. So how do I equip myself to take care of my heart, mind, and soul before everything goes out of control?

For me, reading scriptures and meditating on the truth of the Bible helps to soothe my head-aches and heart-aches and prepare myself for the day ahead. Over the past 6 months, I have been taking one scripture at a time that is written out on a note card and focusing on it every morning for one full week.

The monotony of scripture meditation that this entails helps to etch the precious words into my soul and long-term memory. It's also amazing at all of the different insights you can glean from reading the same scripture multiple days in a row.

If you are interested in using some of the scriptures that have brought a sense of calmness to my own soul, here are 10 verses, with my personal commentary, that I have grown to need like the air I breathe:



1. "A person's steps are directed by the Lord. How then can anyone understand their own way?" (Proverbs 20:24)

If I am living in God's will for my life, then life as I see it won't always make sense and that has got to be ok. Sometimes my path seems fuzzy but it's calming to know I don't have to understand everything.

2. "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God." (Romans 8:26-27)

As a Christian, I have the Holy Spirit dwelling inside of me. Sometimes, I don't know how to verbally express the pain, questions, or needs in my prayers. The Spirit helps me when I am weak and speaks right to my Savior for me.

3. "Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal." (2 Corinthians 4:16-18)

Troubles in this world can make or break us. If we can fix our eyes on the eternity that is set before us after we leave this broken world, we can live a renewed and hopeful life. Getting excited about Heaven is the biggest type of giddy anticipation we can have!

4. "Do everything without grumbling or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure, "children of God without fault in a warped and crooked generation." Then you will shine among them like stars in the sky as you hold firmly to the word of life. And then I will be able to boast on the day of Christ that I did not run or labor in vain. (Philippians 2:14-16)

It's very hard to go throughout life without grumbling or arguing. I've found that this scripture helps me to

"catch" my bad moods and strive to shine as a positive light in my corner of the world. I want to be different in order to make a difference.

5. "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:4-7)

I am going to have hardships and reasons to worry, but worrying does not help a bit. Praying (communicating) with God while remembering my blessings, speaking out what could cause me to worry, and letting God take care of what I don't understand are actions I can take. I then trust that His peace will guard my heart and mind.

6. "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you." (Philippians 4:8-9)

What we think about affects our body. It's biological and a known fact. Thinking on what is true, good, right, pure, lovely, and praiseworthy sets up our minds up for healthy positivity. That transfers to our demeanor, our personality, and our relationships with others.

7. "Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:16-17)

When we teach, advise, and praise God, it's hard for negativity to slide into our heart. Doing everything in the name of Jesus is an excellent way to work on living alongside others in love.

8. "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since

you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." (Colossians 3:23-24)

Your work is important no matter if you're in the spotlight or behind the scenes. Do everything for God and you can't be disappointed if people don't recognize your efforts. You will receive an overwhelming reward from the Lord one glorious day.

9. "Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone." (Colossians 4:5-6)

The way we interact with each other, fellow Christians and those that don't know Christ, is very important. This reminds me to be graceful in my words and opinions, and to pause before I respond. If I feel a hesitation about saying something, then it's best I probably don't.

10. "Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." (Hebrews 13:1-2)

This is one of my favorite verses and reminds me to help and show hospitality to everyone I come in contact with - familiar and unfamiliar. Showing love towards others regardless of their background, looks, status, beliefs, and opinions is imperative. Every single person is important and you never know when an angel is looking your way.




