Conversion is completed by Call!

As Bishop Tom Wright puts it, our calling in "The gospel is not . . . a set of techniques for making people Christians. Nor is it a set of systematic theological reflections, however important. The gospel is the announcement that Jesus is Lord - Lord of the world, Lord of the cosmos, Lord of the earth, of the ozone layer, of whales and waterfalls, of trees and tortoises. As soon as we get this right we destroy at a stroke the disastrous dichotomy that has existed in people's minds between 'preaching the gospel' on the one hand and . . . 'social action' or 'social justice on the other. Preaching the gospel means announcing Jesus (Continued on page 3)

as Lord of the world; and, unless we are prepared to contradict ourselves with every breath we take, we cannot make that announcement without seeking to bring that lordship to bear over every aspect of the world."

We have some amazing examples of how this has been lived out in our community in what I call Caring Connections. Where the vision of Jesus as Lord is lived out in every relationship we have. I am only going to focus on two people of the many I could choose. They approach their *calling* very differently, but also very intentionally.

One person is involved with pastoral care at the legion. I can't believe the number of times that I meet with a family who has been encountering a challenge along life's way and they tell me that this woman has been gracefully and quietly been there to speak to and get support from. It doesn't matter your station in life or your background, she is there to serve. And that is the way she serves in life in general. If you want her opinion she will offer it honestly and directly, thanks be to God, but it always is from the perspective of caring service and with a song in her heart!

The other person I think of in terms of a *calling* to Caring Connections is rarely in the background. She gathers a team together to share in the joy of caring like I have never witnessed before. She remembers people, their relatives and neighbours, distant cousins... well you get the point. She remembers people, all people, because she values every encounter with another human being. We love because God first loved us.

Let us be inspired and encouraged by those around us that we too may enter into the calling of developing Caring Connections, and show that Jesus is Lord!

Attending church online Can't come to church? Let St. Paul's come to you!

Do you have a chronic illness or disability? Are you suffering from a temporary illness or an injury? If any of these reasons or any other circumstances have caused or will cause you to miss attending one of the three services at St. Paul's on a Sunday morning, then modern technology provides an online solution, courtesy of the St. Paul's Tech Team led by Bill Colls.

A camera has been installed in the Church on the rear wall of the Sanctuary close to the door leading out to the Narthex. This camera is turned on all of the time and its output is broadcast continuously on the World Wide Web.

I have some mobility challenges related to my Multiple Sclerosis and my age and for this reason, I find it difficult to get to the 8:00 a.m. Service that my husband and I have attended for many years. For the past few months, at the suggestion of Heather Colls, I have been participating in the Service by viewing it online on my laptop computer.

The video picture is very good. The audio reception from the altar and the pulpit is good; from the lectern it is generally understandable, depending on whether or not the Reader remembers to speak directly into the microphone.

The Scripture Readings and the Psalm for the day are

ule, the St. Paul's Website, and the Bulletin from the previous week. I use these to mark the Readings in my Bible and the Psalm in my Book of Alternative Services before the Service, so that I can follow the Reader more readily.


Watching the congregation arrive and listening to the Church Bells before the Service also adds a sense of "being there." Father John or Father Craig even give my husband a wafer from the Communion for him to bring home to me. On the whole, it is a very satisfactory substitute for actually being in the Church – it is the next best thing.

The system is easy to set up on the computer. Send an email to Bill Colls (<u>william.colls@ncf.ca</u>) for the details.

The system as currently configured is capable of handling a maximum of five viewers at one time, but it could be modified to handle a larger number if necessary.

So, the next time that you are not able to get to Church, try the online version. You will find it to be a very satisfying experience.


