A message from Father John

Easter is the answer

Just recently I had a call from an individual who wanted me to do a funeral service for their mother. This is a normal occurrence at St. Paul's, both Craig and I are asked to do funerals for people who are not members of our parish community. We consider this a great opportunity to help people in the midst of life's difficult moments. We try to offer our own personal support as well as an opportunity to connect with our parish community. Quite often we bring a member of our Pastoral Care team to the funeral and introduce them to the family. In addition we inform the family that memorial prayers will be said for the deceased in the church around 40 days and on the year anniversary of the funeral. They are welcome to attend but the prayers are offered as a comfort to them.

The lady asked me if I would not be too religious and wondered if we really needed to read scripture? In the end, I believe the family was blessed by the service

We are soon to hear the resounding, Christ is Risen! **The Lord is Risen Indeed!** Alleluia!

Let us prepare for the joy of Easter encourage by the words of St. John Chrysostom: "Enter all of you, therefore, into the joy of our Lord; both the first, and last. Let rich and poor rejoice together; both the faithful and the negligent - celebrate this day!"

Part of this Paschal mystery is that Christ "trampled down death by death," (I Corinthians 15:26) "O Death, where is thy sting? O Hades, where is thy victory? (I Cor 15:55) Christ is risen, and you are overthrown! Christ is risen, and the angels rejoice! Christ is risen, and not one dead remains in a tomb! For Christ, being raised from the dead, is become the First-born from the dead."... "Rejoice!"

and the message I offered.

The comments came from a perspective I was not able to truly understand. In addition, I am well aware that many people attend funerals, weddings and baptism out of a sense of obligation and not because of the faith. For many, religion is about rules and moral principles. In other words, they are convinced that the rules and regulations of religion are what we are about. Somehow we are going to judge them. They believe that judgement and condemnation are at the heart of our faith.

I know that the only real message I can offer at a funeral is the truth and meaning of Easter. Easter changes everything. God's Love is so powerful that our greatest fears and weaknesses are transformed by it. He offers that love for free. This is our message and our hope.

I wish you all a blessed Easter,

We live in a time, like so many others, when we are taught by the world to find fault with one another. We are taught and sometimes even encouraged to let anger replace hope, bitterness replace love. Even if the pain that we experience in this world causes us to be separated from those around us, this separation will not have the final word. We are made whole and made one in Christ Jesus.

All that separates us, all that causes pain or suffering, finds its end in the resurrection.

May the Risen Lord, who calls all to unity, make us worthy to witness to that joyous day when our parish, our county, and our world, sanctified by the use of our gifts, may be a beacon of salvation to all.

SchoolBOX Nicaragua Mission Trip, July 2016

HOLA, NICARAGUA!

As a parish we often choose a ministry/outreach project to bless during Lent.

This year our focus is SchoolBOX, whose purpose is to simply to "MAKE EDUCATION POSSIBLE." This amazing ministry began in St. Paul's Almonte. Over the past 10 years, SchoolBOX has built over 49 schools. This ministry provides on-going support for 15,496 students, and school supplies for teachers. 20 schools are involved in their Soccer Dreams program. Tools 4 Schools, Supplies 4 Success, Soccer Dreams and Books 4 Kids round out the full SchoolBOX Program list. They've set up 15 mini-libraries with teacher training, and have hosted 350 international volunteers.

In July 2016, five members of St. Paul's (Cathleen Reid, Janet Tonks, Marsha Fisher, Ray & Lorna Brule) will be travelling with SchoolBOX on a Mission Trip to Masaya, Nicaragua. Our travel partners will be 4 members of St. Thomas' Stittsville, who have made 3 previous trips.

As volunteers, we will be doing some physical labour, ie: assisting in the build. But, even more importantly,

we will be there to encourage their children to attend and stay in school.

The Mirna Martinez School is the school we will be finishing in July. This school will have 3 classrooms, 75 Students and 3 Teachers. To build this School will cost \$74,200 CDN.

St. Paul's Goal towards this cost is \$28,000 CDN.

Nicaragua mission trip update

To my Brothers and Sisters in Christ, I greet you on behalf of the five member Mission Team from St. Paul's, with Thanksgiving and Praise to God for your presence and support of our SchoolBOX Mission Trip. I would like to share our excitement and plans, as I bring you up-to-date on the developments of our trip planned for July 21st to August 1, 2016.

For the benefit of those who are unfamiliar with SchoolBOX, I would like to give you a very introduction. SchoolBOX is a registered Nicaraguan and Canadian Charity that is all about providing the message of education to children; building up their communities; and establishing friendships that stretch across borders. The SchoolBOX mission of "Making Education Possible" for all children in Nicaragua and the world, has been made possible with the aid of SchoolBOX personnel working in conjunction with teachers, community leaders, the Nicaraguan Education System, and the Government in the purchase of land. SchoolBOX provides simple, cost-effective programs to help remove the barriers that prevent children from getting a basic education in Nicaragua.

As founder Tom Affleck, from Almonte, Ontario, discovered, many children were unable to go to school as they did not have a pencil or paper. Those fortunate enough to attend school often dropped out by Grade 5. Tom shared his vision with concerned people in the community and at home, and a Dream materialized. Since 2011, over 49 classrooms have been erected in new schools under the skill and direction of an Engineer, and a Construction Manager, with drivers, Volunteer Coordinators and Guides, who have come together as countrymen to make a difference. Nicaragua has hosted over 350 international volunteers, many of whom have returned to continue their support on other mission trips. The existing schools with over 15,500 students and teachers, have not been forgotten - they are being supported annually with much needed school supplies. These schools are roughly set up in very poor conditions with few facilities, often without walls or a proper roof.

SchoolBOX has four simple, cost effective programs to empower children to go to school and stay in school: Tools 4 Schools, Supplies 4 Success, Soccer Dreams, and Books 4 Kids. Twenty schools are involved in the Soccer Dreams program, and fifteen mini libraries with teacher training has been inaugurated. The Dream of SchoolBOX is being realized, and is truly alive! The community is united in love for the children they serve and the belief that education can defeat poverty. Nicaragua is the second poorest nation in the Hemisphere, with 60% of the population living on less than \$2 a day (2003). SchoolBOX is comprised of thousands of people from different faiths and socioeconomic backgrounds. They empower educators and students, and they in turn empower their communities and change our world - "There is no greater service than to empower a child to reach their true potential".

The focus of our mission trip is as a work team member, to assist at the completion of a school building. As we are arriving when this School project is nearly complete, we are sure to be tasked with the less strenuous but long process of painting, among other jobs at the worksite. As we embark on this adventure journey to Nicaragua, we are told that this beautiful country is home to incredibly kind, generous and friendly people. We are to familiarize ourselves with some Nicaraguan facts, history and customs. Learning simple Spanish phrases will help us gain confidence and aid in our relations and conversations during our stay. We have received reading material to prepare us for the experience of a culture shock, advising us of proper building site attire, information on customs and gestures, we have been given a suggested packing list that will address dressing for the climate, and some health and safety issues that we are to be aware of.

Probably the most important part of the volunteer experience is getting to know the kids. Playing with them is a great way to encourage them to stay in school to achieve their dreams. As volunteers, there are select items that can enhance our relationships with the children. We are encouraged to bring if we wish: a sport item (soccer ball / skipping

rope), art supplies (paper and markers), magic tricks or an instrument in accordance with our own gifts or hobbies to share with the kids we meet. I am in the process of researching and collecting together items that can be easily constructed to make simple musical instruments. I would love to take my love of music and song over to these welcoming people. The children enjoy games of hide and seek, playing with a trompo (a toy like a top with a string), skipping ropes or a hopscotch-type game called rayuela. Many children play checkers and marbles, and popular sports include soccer, baseball, basketball and volleyball.

Our St. Paul's team have signed all necessary documentation, purchased Airline tickets, arranged the necessary Medical, Trip, and Baggage Insurance and we are in the process of setting up our Appointment with the "trip Doctor" to receive the necessary vaccinations. We await our volunteer group Itinerary advising us of our daily agenda while we are there. We are getting ready to playfully look into those gift items that we can take with us that will be allowed within the Airline baggage limits. Soon it will be time to get out the backpack, dust it off, pull out the Summer clothing, find that spring sale of skipping ropes....but first we will put our collective heads together to creatively discuss further fund-raising ideas. Our last fundraiser at The Glen in Stittsville was lots of fun and we raised over \$1,200 for the combined Team of St. Thomas, in Stittsville, and St. Paul's. Together we will be a mighty group of nine, desiring with all our heart, that our Service will be rendered in God's Way. We will be around, so please do not hesitate to approach any one of the team if you have any questions, or suggestions. God Bless you All.

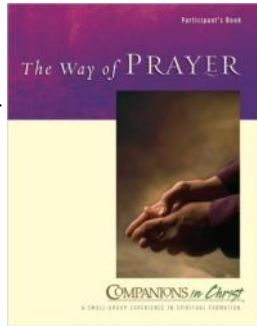

Preparing my heart for Easter

Lent 2016, for me, has been different than those I remember from the past years.

Maybe it is my age that has caused me to pause and ponder this earthly journey and my future.

Maybe it is the loss of friends my age, especially Rick Marples, that has me questioning my own heart and with that, my relationship with ‘The One’ who has saved me.

Maybe it is watching my child nurture and love her children, and being aware of the speed with which that this past year has disappeared.

Maybe it is the “mission trip” to Maniwaki and watching God do miracles in a small town in Quebec.

Maybe it is the prayer, call and preparing for a new mission trip to another small town, but this time in Nicaragua.

Maybe it is...

I know without a doubt that God does not want me so tied up in “religion” that I neglect “relation” – relationship with Him.

Twenty years ago this month, I attended a Cursillo weekend where the bible verse chosen was Galation 3:28b “for you are all one in union with Christ Jesus.” The name of my small group was “One with Christ.”

If this was a prophetic word on my life, and hence a call to a greater relationship with God, then it stands to reason that this relationship needs to grow yet stronger, not become stale or worse – stagnant.

The Ash Wednesday service reminded me that “Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration and to renew our life in the paschal mystery... to observe a holy Lent by... reading and meditating on the word of God.” I am blessed to have discovered a 40 day devotional that I can use on my phone. This article includes ‘Day 22’ of that journey.

It is my hope and prayer that, this Lent, you allow God to unblock the channel that is between your mind (logic, law) and your heart (faith, grace) to freely accept the gift He offers through His Son. I pray that you accept Jesus as your savior and join our group to become “One with Christ.”

From our Book of Alternative Services:

The minister addresses the congregation, saying,

Dear friends in Christ,

every year at the time of the Christian Passover we celebrate our redemption through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration and to renew our life in the paschal mystery.

We begin this holy season by remembering our need for repentance, and for the mercy and forgiveness proclaimed in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

If ashes are used, the following may be said:

We begin our journey to Easter with the sign of ashes, an ancient sign, speaking of the frailty and uncertainty of human life, and marking the penitence of the community as a whole.

The celebrant continues,

I invite you therefore, in the name of the Lord to observe a holy Lent by self-examination, penitence, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, and by reading and meditating on the word of God.

Preparing Our Hearts for Easter: A Lenten Devotional (40 Days)

What is Lent? It is a time in which we anticipate the victory of the light and life of Christ over the darkness of sin and death.

As we journey from Ash Wednesday to Easter, we are reminded of the reality of our frailty and God’s redeeming grace.

"Day 22: The Waters"

In these verses, the Holy One of Israel is crying out through Isaiah, pleading with his people on the eve of destruction to return to the true fountain of life. It is an emphatic call to come without barrier to the eternal spring of living waters. Verses 2 and 3 make clear that this water is the word of God. The invitation is to drink deeply: to receive the word, reason with it, delight in it, to listen to it like they had never listened

before. “Listen diligently” (v. 2) is literally, “Listen-listen!” a call for undivided and sustained attention. Ultimately, this word is meant to save them (v. 3), transform them (v. 7), and make them a blessing to the entire world (v. 5). They are being called into communion with their compassionate God (v. 7). But they refuse to hear him (6:9).

Lent is a time for us to admit the same tendencies displayed by Isaiah’s audience. For reasons conscious and less conscious, we are prone to neglect God’s word, and ultimately, God himself. Given enough time apart from the Scriptures, a kind of spiritual amnesia sets in, where we forget the taste that is sweeter than honey and the drippings of the honeycomb (Psalm 19:10). Lent is an invitation to see Christ as the woman at the well came to see him – as the pure, limitless satisfaction for our thirsty souls. It is our invitation to return to that well and drink deeply. Whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will

become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life (John 4:14).

Prayer

Gracious Lord, in compassion you call us. By your mercy, open our ears to hear your voice, and hearing you, to return. Remove the scales from our eyes and unveil for us the wonders of your word. Your glories are revealed there. Be our delight. Be our satisfaction. Awaken in us a new sense of expectancy, as those who put their trust in you will never be put to shame. Glorious LORD, we are yours. In Christ’s Name, Amen.

The simple truth about love

The Bible teaches us that it's God's will for us to help hurting people. In John 13:34-35, Jesus says, "I give you a new commandment: that you should love one another. Just as I have loved you, so you too should love one another. By this shall all [men] know that you are My disciples, if you love one another [if you keep on showing love among yourselves]" (AMP). Matthew 22:37-38 says, "...You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind (intellect). This is the...first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as [you do] yourself" (AMP).

The love message is the power of the Gospel. It's so simple: Love God and love your neighbor as you love yourself. We often think we need someone to love us, but what we really need is someone to love. And the world is desperate for real love, so it isn't hard to find someone who needs to be loved.

We live in a society that drives people to selfishness. So much of the advertising we see and hear influences us to want more and more and to never be satisfied with what we have. But the more selfish and self-centered we are, the less power we have to do good and help others.

The good news is we have what we need in Christ to overcome a selfish, "What about me?!" mindset and lifestyle.

We have the power of God's love! It's the answer to every dilemma and problem in our society today.



And as Christians, our goal is to represent Christ in the world and show His love.

What Is True Love?

Love is not just a feeling, or a theory, or a nice word. It's action—it's the way you treat people, what you do for others. Love will always cost you something: time, energy, effort, money, giving up your pride, doing what's right when you don't feel like it, keeping a good attitude when you don't get your way.

Loving the way God loves means you love when there's nothing in it for you; it's all about giving out and not expecting anything in return. We're called to outreach, not in-reach. Real love is about dying to self and living to love others.

Before you can love others, you have to experience God's love in your own life, because you can't give away something you don't have. Then you have to be willing to ask God to teach you to love the way He loves.

When you do this, God will enable you to reach out and help someone else. I know this works because I've lived it.

Live to Love!

I used to be selfish, self-centered, always thinking about how I could get my way. And I was miserable. See, I loved God and wanted to love people, but no matter how hard I tried to be sweet and nice to everybody, all of my trying was getting me nowhere. I was cranky, hard to get along with and impatient. God showed me the problem was that I didn't like myself because of the shame of my past. I grew up in an abusive home, and I felt guilty, condemned and ashamed because of it. I had to accept God's love for me before I could love anyone else.

So I decided to study God's love in the Word, pray for God to change my heart, and confess what His Word says about His love for me. Every day I would say out loud, "God loves me," and I would say it over

and over to purposely keep this truth in my heart throughout the day. After a year of doing this, I finally got a revelation about God's love for me.

St. Paul's refugee sponsorship update

The Wakass family are on their way!

At our Vestry meeting in February, St. Paul's decided to sponsor a Christian refugee family from Syria: the Wakass family – Claude and her two sons, Mousa (14) and Eskander (12) – who are relatives of a family sponsored by Holy Redeemer parish. At this time, the required paperwork has been filed and the family has moved to Lebanon, where they are now waiting for a call from the Embassy to set up their medical checks and interview with Immigration. 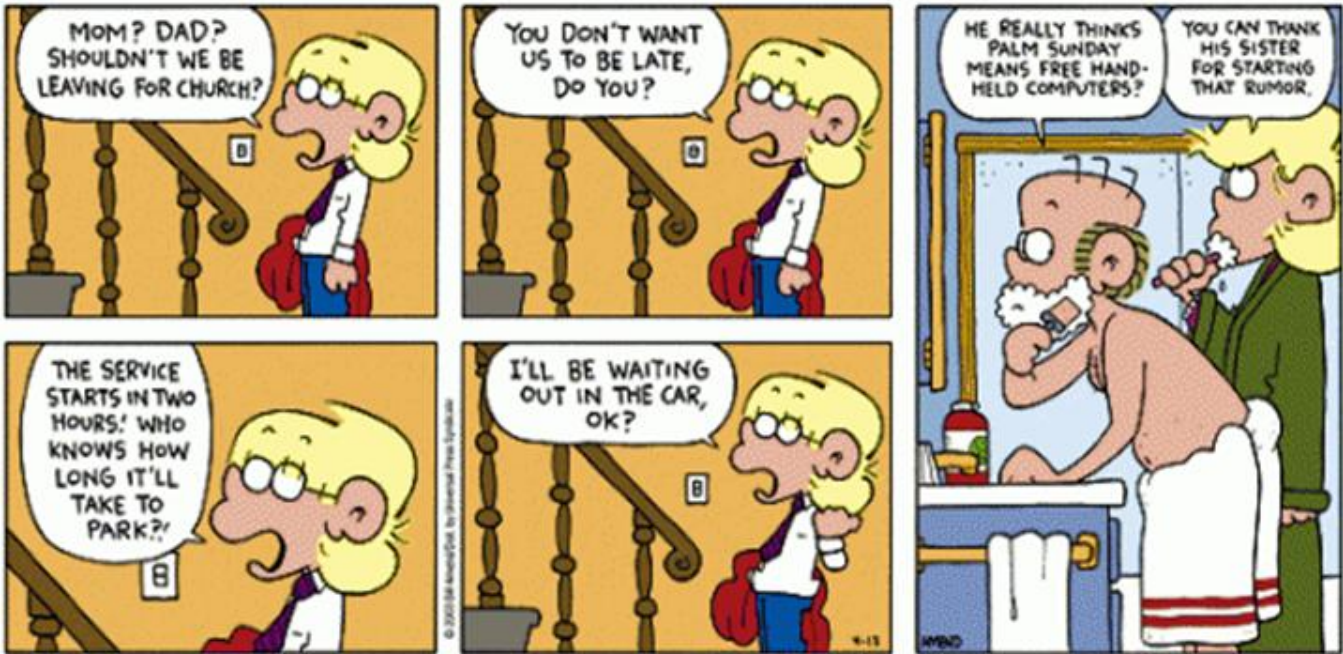
