- Because we cannot silence nor send our children away and then cry out in confusion when they do not wish to participate in "our" liturgy when they're older.

Newborns to grandmothers, toddlers mid-tantrum and the bad singers and the gentleman whose hearing aid makes that high pitched sound, the person looking at their social media and the person falling asleep during the sermon — all of THIS creates the body of Christ. And it is beautiful and wonderful, sometimes noisy and disruptive.

But if nothing else, we come to worship each week to have an experience and an encounter with Christ. You are invited each week and we strive to make this space warm and welcoming for you. We must also, as Christ invited us, invite the little children to come.

Big Fruit from the Big Give

A note from Bill and Lorna: Once again, thanks to those who supported the Big Give Plant Sale at St. Paul's. We were one part of a huge outpouring of God's Grace across Ontario and Canada.

This year's Big Give saw tremendous growth, in-

creasing from 66 churches, in 2016, to 92 this year. With the growth has come amazing stories of lives touched by a united Church demonstrating Christ's love.

"As churches started hearing about the Big Give, they started calling us. That's how it spread," says Kathy Blakely, the Big Give's founder. "The number of churches that registered really surprised me. All the stories are so encouraging to me."

In Cobden, and several other communities, churches from different

denominations came together to host a unified Big Give event. One guest at the Cobden event was a homeless man named Tony, who was camping in the area.

"He got a few items; one was a sleeping bag," says Laurie Briscoe, who was Cobden Pentecostal Church's point person in the collaborative event. "He came to our church the following day."

As well as the pastoral advice he was seeking, the church gave him food from their food cupboard and Briscoe says some members helped him financially.

"He came a few more weeks, consecutively, after that and I know one individual from our congregation was trying to help him find a job."

Briscoe says she hasn't seen him in the past few

weeks and thinks he left the area, but she is encouraged by how God worked and was pleased to see the collaboration among the churches.

Pickering Pentecostal Church also saw an exciting example of God's providence. One of their guests found the only wedding dress they had (complete with a veil). She was in tears when she realized it fit her perfectly. She told volunteers she was getting

married soon, but didn't have the \$3,000 a dress would cost her.

Another couple had only been in Canada for one week. They were excited to find winter coats and a number of other necessities for life in Canada.

Blakely says they saw the biggest growth around Toronto. Some of the 15 new churches joining from Toronto were even visited for a CTV feature covering the events.

"One of our church members brought a neighbour who was a Muslim gal."

Toronto New Covenant Cathedral prepared care packages for young women living as prostitutes and sent 40 volunteers and two boxes of supplies to St Margaret's Drop-in Centre, a homeless shelter in downtown Toronto.

They also had a free garage sale, with a barbecue, games for children, and bags of free groceries.

"We had folks who had just moved into the community and were surprised that a church would do this," says Robert Lindo, the church's Big Give coordinator. "People appreciated the groceries, especially. There were some folks who tried to force us to take a donation. We told them, 'No, this is not about a donation. It's all about giving to the needs of the community. Take whatever you need and God bless (Continued on page 8)

you."

Lindo says they had lots of opportunities to explain that they were doing this because of the love of Jesus.

"It was one of those moments that made us feel that much more representative of Jesus," he explains.

Ben Kennedy of Catch The Fire Toronto says their event included a "spiritual café," where guests could receive a prophetic word.

"One of our church members brought a neighbour who was a Hindu gal. She was really blessed and touched from the prophetic word she received," Kennedy states. "She was in tears and said it was lifegiving."

Kennedy says she told them she wanted to come to their services with her 13-year-old son.

Another lady was surprised everything was free and

told Kennedy, "It was such an incredible thing to be able to come and pick out some clothes that I could never afford."


Volunteers delivered a number of furniture items to another guest's house. When they got there, they realized the kids had been sleeping on the floor because they had no furniture.

The Big Give was even recognized in the House of Commons, where Nepean MP Chandra Arya thanked local churches for their generosity. Yet, more than the publicity, Blakely says she is excited by the stories of how God worked and the unity churches displayed.

"The original dream was that the Big Give would happen in Ottawa; churches of all denominations would all do something together on the same day. To see all the denominations and communities jumping on board and wanting to be part of this is very encouraging. It's great."

GIFT Campaign 5th Anniversary Update September 2017

Five years ago this month, we officially initiated our GIFT financial Campaign, in partnership with the Diocese of Ottawa, with a goal of \$400,000. We are indeed blessed at this 5th anniversary to report that we have already received funds totaling \$501,900 with more than \$20,000 yet to come by year end from the fulfilment of outstanding pledges. To have exceeded our original goal by more than 25% is a testament to the generosity and faithfulness of this Parish working to fulfil God's plan for us.

Accomplished so far with the funds received is a \$300,000 reduction in our building mortgage, a \$50,000 contribution to various Diocesan GIFT initiatives, and \$50,000 to complete a replacement of the clerestory roof. The remaining funds (over \$120,000) have been designated specifically for Mission and Ministry programs at St Paul's, the details of which will be decided at Vestry.

While there are still a few Campaign donations yet to be received, this 5th anniversary of GIFT at St Paul's is well worth recognizing. You are invited to join us on Sunday September 24th at our regular services to celebrate this remarkable financial campaign accomplishment.

SchoolBOX 2018 mission update (Father Rick's school)

For most children in North America, this week is back to school. Most children in North America have new clothes, new supplies, a short walk or bus ride to a weatherproof building and individual classrooms for each grade: blessed with abundance.

In Nicaragua, things are much different, but change is happening to get children into schools with new supplies, one classroom at a time, with SchoolBOX.

A notebook and pencil.

While in a tiny village in Northern Nicaragua, Tom Affleck, SchoolBOX founder gave two young girls a notebook and a pencil. One of their fathers, seeing this simple gift smiled broadly and said "Now that you have a notebook and a pencil you can go to school this year." This simple statement profoundly impacted Tom and eventually led to the creation of SchoolBOX.

Making Education Possible.

A handful of years later, SchoolBOX is 'Making Education Possible' by helping thousands and thousands of kids go to school. What began with one man's quest to find healing and meaning has grown into a movement involving individuals, families and organizations across North America, Europe, and Central America. Dubbed the "little organization



that could," SchoolBOX is a wonderful testimony to what can be achieved through love, perseverance and community.

Five members of St. Paul's headed to Nicaragua in 2016 to experience the giving of time, talent and treasure to help see a village get two classrooms that are the whole school. The plan is to go back in 2018 to build a classroom in another village to help more children. This one, though, will be personal. The school will be built in memory of Father Rick Marples, who served at St. Paul's for over 10 years.

The build will cost money. Some donations and fundraising activity have happened to get the build started. The latest event was "The Boot Sale" (garage sale from the back of a car) held on August 19.

The weather, although cloudy, was perfect. A total of 11 "boots" had reserved spots, and a popcorn and beverage table doubled as an information station.

There was a steady stream of shoppers. It was not crowded, but there always seemed to be some people looking around. We were blessed to have some really great conversations with some of the folks that came, and we had a few people just give a donation to the cause.

The sellers were appreciative of the organization of the event and of the fact that they didn't have much to do but come drive into their spot. Everyone sold stuff, but no one sold out.

A total of \$580.00 was raised for Father Rick's school build, which brought the total to just under \$7000, for which we thank God and thank St. Paul's community for the support.

We learned a lot in this first boot sale event and will put that knowledge to work for at least one more next spring.

Now that we are back to "business as usual," the focus begins to turn to planning the build trip. The trip dates for the Father Rick School volunteer group are: August 16-25, 2018.

Iris 3-year mission to South Africa

I've been part of St. Paul's since November, 2000. During these years, one question has been asked again and again: "When are you going on another mission trip?" I was even asked this when I attended Algonquin College for radio broadcasting. You knew my heart then, and you still do. Well, now Tony and I are being called overseas for three YEARS. This is not a short-term mission.

I've now been on ten short-term missions - seven of those involving St. Paul's through prayer, encouragement and finances from my loving St. Paul's family. Most of those ministry trips were in Africa: Kenya, Sierra Leone and last year to Mozambique and South Africa. Last year, my husband, Tony, and I fell in love with South Africa - the landscape, food and especially the people. Our hearts were especially tugged by those we call the "latch key" orphans of the poor neighbourhoods and townships. These children had sad, empty eyes, and often missed their parents, who were usually working a number of lowpaid service jobs just to make ends meet. I couldn't get the image of them out of my mind, as I sensed a calling that had been hinted at in a series of dreams given to both Tony and myself last year.

The first such dream was given to Tony – who dreamed I had a baby. Babies in dreams often signify the beginning of a new ministry. Since we were in Africa, it was natural to assume that the baby would be black. When I asked Tony the baby's ethnicity, he told me that he was so distracted in the dream that he didn't actually SEE the baby. So I asked God to give me the dream. I was given a pic-



ture of the baby during a time of worship a day later. After I asked to see the baby, the baby was black – at first. The baby's colour kept changing and I was clueless on what that meant.

Johan and Marie, the directors of the South African Iris base, are gifted in the area of dream interpretation - and I shared this dream, as well as others. Johan laughed when I shared about the baby. He told me, "That's a rainbow baby. Do you know what South Africa is often called? The RAINBOW Nation." Both confirmed our call to South Africa - and began to pray about our part in helping expand their base. Some of the other dreams and confirmations are noted on my website (coppleswesterncape.ca, on the dreams page). Iris also signifies RAINBOW in Greek (in Greek mythology, Iris is the personification of the rainbow), and Portuguese (Arco-Iris -Rainbow). That's the rainbow again. Then there is the image of the rainbow that keeps showing up in my latest drawings, drawn in the context of worship. Not only is it a biblical promise, like it was in Genesis, but it's a reminder of the ministry and place where we are being called.

The Iris Western Cape base is actually a farm, mountain retreat and winery between Robertson and Worcester on Highway 62 in the beautiful Breede River Valley. This is a part of the Cape Winelands district of Western Cape (to the south west of South Africa). It's an incredibly beautiful and fruitful area. We will expand the work of the base from the farm and nearby Robertson to the small city of Worcester. We plan to have a Kid's club, teach art, the love of God, radio and many practical things as we settle in the area. We will support and work with the base in administration, pastoral care ministry, and local mission trips in the province.
