A Message from Father John

Summer - Time to Refresh and Revitalize

I love the summer. I think that we all look forward to the long days of summer as a time of refreshment. We

organize and plan family time during the summer with the hope that life's hectic pace can slow down enough for us to stop and smell the roses. It is important to take this time to rejuvenate, and begin to put things back into focus. Summer is a perfect time to revitalize our prayer life and deepen our commitment to ministry.

On May 15, St. Paul's held a Town Hall meeting to gather insight, hopes and dreams from the people of our parish. The night was divided into three segments, with discussion about each of these questions:

- 1. How are we called to be **Jesus' hands and feet** in Kanata, Canada, the World, now and in the future?
- 2. How are we to address the need for **continued quality leadership** in the parish?
- 3. How should St. Paul's plan to allocate its portion of the funds raised (beyond the initial \$300,000) through the **GIFT Campaign**?

After some great discussion, ideas were written down and placed on newsprint on the wall. The fifty people present each selected their top 2 choices in each of the three categories.

The following are the top three votes cast in each category:



1. Jesus' Hands and Feet:

Reach out to the youth - homework clubs, in parish act., mission trips.

More Education - Adult Sunday School, Small Groups.

Enhance Communication - e.g.: Podcast

2. Leadership:

Improve leadership training and mentoring
Find talent and develop it - workshops, questionnaires

Gather ideas and provide feedback

3. Gift Campaign:

Enhance Youth Programming - engage our younger generations and equip them to become active and faithful leaders in our church, community and world.

Air Conditioning in the Hall – to increase our external rental opportunities, and makes a welcoming environment for the community and newcomers.

Expand Seniors Programming - through improved transportation

As we listen to each other and actively discern God's will, I am convinced that we are being called into action and ministry. We the Church need to actively listen to God's voice and share our perceptions of God's call to us. This is Good News.

I hope that you will all enjoy the beauty of summer and find it refreshing to your souls. May God continue to reveal His glory to us all.

The Pastoral Care Team is led by Minx Mulhall. You may meet one of The Team as a result of asking for a pastoral visit for yourself, or having someone else ask on your behalf. You may ask Frs. John

telling stories or playing games with the God Squad, or making a contribution to the G.I.F.T. campaign —



what a joy it is to participate, to engage life so fully! Summer should be a time to enjoy the beauty of this great land of Canada, a time to embrace the joy of serving together in a common hope!

I pray you meet old friends over the summer and definitely a few new ones. We always have visitors in the summer at St. Paul's. Say hello, welcome them to coffee and fellowship!

If you are visiting another church, send greetings from St. Paul's. Remind them they have brothers and sisters sharing the journey with them.

In all things give thanks. Every blessing as we share the joy of the season together.

or Craig, call the office at 613-836-1001 or speak to Minx directly. Initially, all requests will go to Fr. John. Visits can be via the telephone or in person and the length of the visit will vary depending on your situation. Whether it be a one-time meeting or several meetings over a longer period of time, our pastoral care members will be there to offer you an attentive and consoling ear and pray with you that God will intervene in your particular situation and guide you through it, whatever the circumstances. The main message here is that Pastoral Care is for everyone. No situation is worse or better than another, none is bigger or more important than another; if something is upsetting your normal life's

pattern and you need an objective, compassionate, listening ear, please make that request. There are a myriad of losses and changes we may encounter in our lives, detours we all come upon at one time or another on our life's journey, and none of them are respecters of age, gender or lifestyle. God is the answer and we are but messengers who can help in difficult situations. Contact us.

The Memorial Prayers that are announced roughly every six to eight weeks, also are an initiative of the Pastoral Care Team. These times of prayer come about following the funeral of someone, either one of our own parishioners or for someone else at whose funeral Frs. John or Craig officiated. Over the past couple of years, these prayers have been reworked, but their background stems from an ancient funeral rite. Anybody can ask that a person be named during these Prayers, even if they passed away elsewhere. These Memorial Prayers are held after our regular 11:00 o'clock service. Whether relatives and/or friends attend these Payers or not, the names of the deceased are spoken and we are told, time and again, how comforting these words are to those who mourn. Anybody can attend these prayers and I'd encourage you to do so, as your presence would be very supportive to those who have recently lost someone. We gather for about 15 minutes and for those coming from outside our parish, we always invite them to attend the 11:00 service before, as there's a certain level of comfort to being in the church beforehand.

The Healing Ministry is led by Cathleen Reid. You are probably most familiar with this Team from your encounters with them at our Sunday Services, when members of the Healing Team come forward to receive your healing prayer requests. Those needing prayer for healing come forward following Communion because this was the norm in Jesus' time. Although we may not consciously think about the process of receiving the Body and Blood of our Lord, Jesus Christ, coming forward to receive Communion includes the following: 1. an act of confession for your sins 2. an absolution of your sins by the receiving of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ at the communion rail and finally, 3. a request for healing.

We understand that people may feel shy about coming to the front of the church, but those few minutes spent in prayer with members of the Healing Team may be all someone needs to free them from the anxiety and torment that has come into their life. You may come to the healing station as often as needed. A second team of two will be in the Chapel if needed. One comment we often hear is that "members of the Team never ask me how things are going following a visit to the healing station." This is done deliberately to avoid any potential embarrassment. However, if you wish to initiate a conversation pertaining to your time at the Healing Station, Team members are always open for further conversation. Healing Team Members are guided through these encounters by God, through His Son Jesus Christ and by the Holy Spirit. We are merely the messengers who, hopefully, bring those needed words of comfort and understanding to the person asking for healing. Please come to the Healing Station yourself or with a friend or family member and bring your requests for yourself or for others. Nothing that is said at the time of healing is ever divulged to anybody, nor do the two members of the Healing Team discuss anything they've heard with each other. Your prayer time with the Healing Team may lead you to ask for a personal or telephone visit with a member of the Pastoral Care Team or for continued prayer with members of the Prayer Chain.

Healing Team members also come together at Healing Services. These services are led by Frs John and Craig and are held in the evenings. They're advertised in your Bulletins, on our Website, on our Church Crier, Gabriel and verbally during Sunday announcements. Historically, we have held Healing Services around such topics as Blue Christmas for those who find this holiday difficult and we have also had Healing Services around different themes such as grief, loss, and so on. Even if you, yourself, are not experiencing one of these issues, you may wish to accompany and support a friend, neighbour, colleague or family member who is. These Healing Services are open to the community.

The Prayer Chain Team is led by Joan Andrews. The people on Joan's Team begin praying for you and your situation as soon as they are informed of your needs and they continue to do so until they're told otherwise. Contacting the Prayer Chain Team is a quiet, effective, immediate way to receive prayer for yourself or for someone you know and care about. The chain works by Joan calling one person and that one calls the next, etc, thus forming "the chain." There are six to eight people who form the chain. Neither your name or the names of others involved in your situation are ever discussed with anyone. These faithful Prayer Warriors simply uphold you and others within the confines of their own homes and hearts.

The Telephone Ministry is a fairly unique service offered to parishioners of St. Paul's, and sometimes to groups of people living in Retirement/Nursing Homes. This ministry is led by Heather and Bill Colls. If someone is unable to physically attend a church service, but would like to hear it from their home, hospital bed, nursing or retirement home, they can do so as long as they have a telephone. They need only ask for the service by calling Heather or Bill at 613-226-6813. You can also speak to one of the priests, or call the church office at 613-836-1001 and either Heather or Bill will hook you up from church, simply by calling you on your telephone. You may choose to "join" any one of our three services. At the end of the service, Heather or Bill will bring you Communion. The Telephone Ministry can be used as many times as you need it.

Here are a some general facts about Pastoral Care that you should know:

- Any conversation between you and any person belonging to a Pastoral Care Ministry is strictly confidential.
- Once you have contacted any of the people in these ministries, you can ask for further prayer or further conversation via one of the other branches of our Pastoral Care ministries. For example, you may come up for Healing on a Sunday morning and then ask for continued prayer via the Prayer Chain.

- If we are not meeting your needs and you have suggestions, please bring them to any of the Leaders mentioned above, to the office or to the Priests.
- If you feel called to any of the above ministrie, or want more information about the type of work done, the time commitment or anything else, please approach any of the abovementioned people who will be happy to have a chat with you.
- One last note, which indirectly falls under the term "prayer": when writing your prayer requests in the book on the table beside the sidespersons on any given Sunday morning, please just put the first name of the person down. If you are requesting prayers for a family, list them individually by their first name starting with eg "the family of John, Susan...". If it's a baby, you can put "Baby John," for example.

I hope this summary will help you feel more confident about approaching the Pastoral Care Teams. Remember, we are all The Church and St. Paul's is our Christian Family. As we would with our own biological families, we are called to love, nourish and serve each family member. Don't stew in silence; come forward and we will try and respond to your needs.

GIFT Campaign Update

St. Paul's is participating in the Diocese of Ottawa's \$12 million GIFT Campaign. Our parish goal is to raise \$400,000 over the next 5 years. The first \$300,000 will go directly towards reducing our mortgage, which is currently at \$875,000. As an added bonus, the Diocese will waive interest payments for the next 5 years, which would an additional \$35,000 cost us (approximately) per year. The last \$100,000 will be split 50/50 with the Diocese. Our 50% of that last \$100,000 will go towards youth programs, air conditioning for the hall, and senior programs. Any additional money raised above our \$400,000 goal will come directly to St. Paul's.

HOW will you be asked to participate?

All St. Paul's parishioners will be contacted by an "Ambassador" – a member of the GIFT Campaign Team who will have been trained to promote and answer questions about the Campaign. Ambassadors will, by phone or through a personal visit, offer their fellow parishioners the opportunity to participate in the campaign. Please make these ambassadors welcome when you are contacted.

Speaking of Ambassadors... we need more! If you are interested in finding out what it means to be a St. Paul's Ambassador (without making a commitment to be one), please come to the Ambassador Training/Information session on

Wednesday, June 27 (either 1:00-3:00 p.m. or 7:00-9:00 p.m.). Please let the church office know which session you plan to attend (613-836-1001). Another session will be held in late August or early September if you cannot attend at this time.

WHEN will you be asked to participate?

Due to the size of our parish (almost 550 households), we have divided the parish roll into 4 "phases": Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Although our official Campaign Launch will be held September 16th (coincident with the 8th anniversary of the opening of our current church building), we will begin contacting people assigned to the Matthew Phase over the summer. By November 25th, 2012, our Commitment Sunday, everyone will have been invited to participate in this important five-year campaign.

We look forward to sharing with you our GIFT Campaign progress over the next few months as we all work towards revitalizing the on-going vision of St. Paul's!

FWYC Camping Weekend

Our annual FWYC Camping Weekend (families with youth or young children) will be July 13-15 at Fitzroy Harbour Provincial Park. We hope you can join us!

The costs will be:

- \$30 deposit (non-refundable) for each family camping overnight
- \$71.00 per night (for a group site for up to 50 people), plus a one time \$11.25 reservation fee This will be divided equally amongst families who attend.
- For each person there is then an additional fee (charged at the gate): 6-17yrs \$1.25 per night, >18yrs \$4.75 per night
- For each vehicle \$3.75 per night
- Park day fee is \$14.00 per vehicle, if you would prefer to join us for Saturday only.

If you will be coming for Saturday only, the park fee will be charged at the gate — you do not need to reserve with us. You can ask for the group camping sites and find us that way.

Each family should provide their own food. Many families also bring snacks to share too!

We are hoping to have another "cook out" at the beach, perhaps roast your own hot dogs on Saturday (if there is no fire ban) for lunch, and a "pot luck" desert (fruit, cookies, something simple).

Saturday night will be the traditional chili dinner. Each family brings a chili Saturday night and they are combined into two big pots (one vegetarian and one for meat lovers!) A few buns can complete your meal, with fruit salad "pot luck" for desert. If every one brings different fruits we can cut and combine them for a tasty desert.

Other meals will be on your own. We can use the park all day Sunday (although we have to leave the site by noon), so plan your meals accordingly.

Participating stores include: Farm Boy (5.5%), Bulk Barn (5%), Food Basics/METRO (4%), Loblaws (4%), Superstore (4%), and Independent (4%). Starting September 25, 2011, we will have \$20, \$50, and \$100 Sobey's certificates for sale.

Smart Card technology allows you to purchase a card, say for \$100. You get the full \$100 to spend at that store. Each time you shop, the amount of your purchase is deducted, leaving the remaining balance on the card for the next time.

We are now able to process debit cards! No need to worry about carrying cash or forgetting your chequebook.

Another Successful Chicken BBO

On Friday, June 8, St. Paul's once again held its annual chicken BBQ. This fund-raising effort involved over 50 people working that day or in the days before, and over 200 chickens. Many thanks to all those who helped make the event a success, especially all of you who brought in pies. Somehow you seem to know just how many pies we need! The chickens were delicious and the coleslaw was again home-made and superb. In the end, just over \$3000 was raised to help St. Paul's support its many activities.

Once again St. Paul's was blessed with wonderful weather. Had the BBQ been held a week earlier, we would have had boiled chicken. With the sun streaming down, the BBQing team, led by Michael Turnbull, had to hide in the shade to keep from being cooked. When the rain finally did come down, it was after the cooking had been done, and produced a great rainbow a few minutes later. The ladies, led by Joan Ferrier, were busy in the kitchen putting the pies onto the plates and the buns and butter into the bags, while the serving line kept the chickens flowing. The whole system operated like a well-oiled machine. Those who participated had a lot of fun - after all, having fun is one of the main purposes of having the BBQ! just ask Wayne Keech about large poultry.

We always have room for more volunteers. High school students can earn three or more hours of volunteer time by participating, while families can get involved in many different aspects of the BBQ.

Only 420 chickens were sold this year, down from just over 600 last year. Many people were away, while the price scared others. The price had to be raised to keep pace with the increasing costs of all the supplies, especially the chicken. At \$15, it is anticipated that this price can be maintained for at least five years. Had the price not been raised, less than \$1000 would have been made if ticket sales had been at 600. For a fund-raising effort, this

would have been a very small return for the huge effort made by so many.

To all those who bought chickens or volunteered, parish council expresses their thanks for making the BBQ a success again this year. We hope to see you all again next year!


