

7:00 p.m. every other Friday — St. Paul's Youth (SPY) Group will resume in September.



A message from Father John Reflections on our trip to England and Scotland

Although the majority of our time away was for vacation and relaxation, we did manage to work a couple of days on church business. Fr. Bill

and I took the opportunity to interview a number of people in London and York who have first-hand experience of working with team ministry. In some cases they have been using teams for ministry supply for over 30 years and have insights and observations that we can draw upon.

Although we are new comers to the idea of team ministry, their knowledge and perspectives about challenges are extremely valuable. Charles Boole, who studied in England, set us up for a couple of conversations in York with people who he knew had been working in team ministry, including a gentleman who has written a book on the subject.

It was wonderful to hear their experience about what had worked and what problems they faced over the years. We have just begun to analyze the information that we received but I can share with you that we are

very positive about the lessons learned. We are recommitted to the value and exercise of team ministry to meet the challenges that face the church in the next 20 years. We see it as a tool that can bless congregations and clergy as they work together with limited resources. The model can help us to deliver more ministry while costing us less.

In addition, we worshipped with two Church of Scotland congregations on our holiday and were blessed by their joy and devotion to the Lord. It is always a blessing to travel and see that the Church throughout the world is alive and active.

I hope in the next few months I can share some of our findings from the trip in more detail.

A period of quietness prior to the service is a time when we can experience those things that prepare our hearts and minds to receive whatever message God may have for us.

My thoughts lead me to some of the exhortations we find in the scriptures:

"Be quiet, for the day is holy" (Neh 8:11).

"The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before Him" (Hab 2:20).

"For God alone my soul waits in silence" (Ps 62:5).

"Be silent, all flesh before the Lord" (Zech 2:13).

Evangelism workshop: You want me to do WHAT? September 23, with Rev. Eric Morin

Matthew 28:16-20 reads, "Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. 17 When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. 18 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Chances are your parents took you to that building known as a church when you were a child on Sunday, and perhaps there was even some protesting happening,, but they brought you anyway. You are here because somewhere, at some time in your life, someone shared their faith with you and invited you to come to church. And today here you are, here we are. All I can say is this: Thank God for their resolve and keeping to the faith.

But what about the ones who were not brought to church by their parents? What about the ones who have never heard about the "Good News"? Who will invite them? Well, as we read in Matthew 28:16-20, that is up to us. Today, we are the disciples, and we are to go and make disciples of all nations.

So, "You want me to do WHAT?" is an interactive workshop designed to help us do just that: be the disciples Jesus calls us to be.

With the facilitation of Reverend Eric Morin, we will explore what the Good News is, and find ways to share it appropriately, in good Anglican tradition (lose the idea of standing on the street corner hand-



ing out tracts and saying, "Do you know where you are going after you die?"). This workshop will explore various situations in the culture and the context that we live in today, and help us learn how to respond in a faith-based manner that is unique to who we are as individuals.

I have been promised that there is no memory work!

Come and discover the tools and gifts that the Holy Spirit has given us to speak to others about the Good News.

This is an invitation to explore our faith together, and explore ways of sharing our faith with others on a daily basis, in the workplace and within our social circles.

This interactive session explores the following:

Why do we need to share our Faith? What is it exactly that we share? When do we share? Who do we share it with? How do we share it?

When: September23rd, 2017, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Where: Based on the amount of interest, this interactive session will be held either at St. Paul's or at my home.

Our facilitator, Reverend Eric Morin, assures us that this is not a "talking head" session. We will all be challenged and hopefully come up with tools that will work for you and me (not necessarily the same tools!). The time together will provide an individualized approach. The goal of this workshop is to provide a personalized plan to carry out that scary work called "evangelization."


Meditation minute

More and more people are aware that somehow or other, in modern life, we have lost contact with what is essential. Contact is lost with our own essential being, our own centre. The problem we face, as a consequence, is that we have ceased to look upon our religious practice or our spiritual practice in terms of a discipline. More often we look upon our religious or spiritual commitment in terms of what we get out of it. We had a young man from London staying with us last year and as we were talking one day he said something "You know, Father John, you'll be to this effect: shocked when you hear this, but I gave up religion because I wasn't getting anything out of it. Blimey, when I think of it now I wake up in the night and cold shivers run down my spine. Imagine, I was thinking what I was going to get out of it." He had begun to remake contact.

I imagine all of us have adopted this ego-centred approach to our religious or spiritual practice at some time. We too need to examine the true nature of our religious life to find a way to begin decreasing the egotistical element in it. We need to be grasped by the truth that religious values are not to be exploited or experimented with because they – and the sacred they represent – call on us for commitment. As soon as we have begun to commit ourselves we have begun a journey. It is a journey that asks for discipline, and the challenge to us is that it is a journey away from our own egoism.

Thomas came home less than a week later, but still goes into CHEO once or twice a week for blood work or for IV medication. He still gets his tube feedings, but is starting to eat a bit better. This week he actually ate some steak! And he's certainly feeling well and is a typical two year old, very busy and full of energy!

He has to go back to Toronto next week for a kidney biopsy, just to make sure there is no sign of rejection. If you ask him, "where is Tracy's kidney?" he points to his belly and says, "dare!" His speech is still behind but is picking up every week, a few more words at a time.

Thomas was featured on this year's CHEO telethon, with interviews with Karin, Andrew and the kids. It will be available on you-tube if you want to see it.

Tracy has recovered well also. She took the time to rest and get better but now she's doing some of the jobs on her to-do list, a good sign she's feeling better! We are so thankful that she has done this for Thomas. They have a very special bond, now more than ever. One word Thomas has learned is "Ishy," which is what the kids call Tracy. That made her day when he finally called her Ishy. ♥
















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
