Dreams become reality only when the dreamers are committed and make the dream come true. As a member of St. Paul's I ask you to pray and support this dream.

Warden's Report

When we left off last year, we were about to embark on a prayerful and exciting journey that would see us build a new church based on the architectural drawings submitted by Ralph Vandenberg & Associates. The rookie warden and the seasoned professional faced a daunting challenge. In tandem with the Construction Manager and Father John we were charged to oversee the project.

After deciding on Ralph Vandenberg, we waited with much anticipation to see the final product – what would it look like, what would it cost. We had formulated our budget. We had three areas to draw upon: The funds we have in the consolidated trust, mortgage financing from the Dioceses and the Anglican Foundation, and the Capitol Campaign to raise \$800,000. All looked good for the future.

However, as you know the plans came back \$1.1 million over our budget. We prayed, deliberated, cut, prayed some more and cut some more until we were able to eliminate \$700,000 of the estimated cost from the Vandenberg plans. Alas, that still left us \$400,000 over budget. Once again prayers were said, the wise and faithful came out to a special vestry and faithfully and prayerfully responded to our request and approved the additional expenditure of \$400,000 plus an additional \$100,000 as contingency funding. Once again our project was back on track.

And so it all began. We removed the stone, and all the other valuable and commemorative items, from the old building, and set up our temporary space in the church hall. The old church came down. We had the ground-breaking ceremony, the bulldozers rolled in, the ground was dug and construction began. Once it began, it has progressed with amazing swiftness, even given the trials and tribulations that befell this project.

You can see for yourselves now - it is starting to look like a church. You can see the outline, the roof, the sanctuary, the hall, offices and classrooms - and when it all comes to fruition, we will have our new worship space, where we can praise God together and thank him for this truly blessed structure.

We thank God every day for the blessings that have been bestowed upon us in the way of Father John. He is a gifted priest and his expertise and wisdom has been so integral to this project. We want to take this opportunity to officially thank him.

We have had an eventful year in the personnel of St. Paul's. Father Lee completed his curacy and has gone to the next phase of his life. Allison has returned to school and while still a parishioner with her family is on a leave of absence. Nancy Moxley has been a valuable asset to our team and we want to take this opportunity to thank her for her outstanding contributions in the operation of the office and her assistance to the wardens, to Father John, and the entire congregation. Don Krull, after more than 10 years of leading our contemporary worship music group, decided that he needed to pursue other interests and has left the group. We take this opportunity to thank him for his dedicated and expert leadership. Our Director of Music Ann Faurbo has taken over the leadership of this group.

And last but by no means least; we want to recognize our parishioners – who have met all the challenges head on. Each member has contributed in their own way to the various ministries and given us their blessings and making our job so much easier. Thank you to all.

While the Church Hall is an adequate temporary worship space, it most certainly has provided some challenges. I think we all can probably think of one or two. However, given what we had to work with we believe that the fact that we have remained in our own space has made us a much more cohesive group of parishioners and if we can overcome these challenges, we can overcome anything. Those that pray together stay together.

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On a go forward basis, next year when we write this report – we will be thanking God for all his blessings and occupying our new building – our ministries will be flourishing and we will have celebrated the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ in our new home, St. Paul's the new version.

Treasurers' Comments:

Income Statement:

As reflected above, St. Paul's will report a loss of \$7,600 for 2003 representing approximately 3% of the budget approved at Vestry last year.

Looking at Income, the largest variance relates to the shortfall in *Receiptable Income*. Although we have always set ourselves a challenge budget for giving, the fact is, we have always increased our giving from one year to the next. The surprise for 2003 relates to the fact that total giving was actually \$8,000 less than in 2002. Reasons for this relate directly to reduced attendance upon moving into the hall and the sustained economic unrest within the high tech industry. It is worth noting that had we been able to maintain our level of giving from 2002, we would have achieved a breakeven result.

Regarding expenses, total spending was \$15,000 below budget in 2003. *Salaries & Employee* costs were below budget attributable primarily to the departure of Father Lee in the fall. However, part of this budget was redirected to program spending in *Education, Music & Liturgy* with the hiring of a part-time Youth program co-ordinator and a Sunday School Co-ordinator. The net savings across these two budgets amounted to \$12,300 (i.e. \$15,300 - \$3,000). The balance of the budget savings of \$2,700 reflects spending at truly bare bones levels for 2003.

Cash Flow:

Despite the shortfall from operations, I can report that our obligations to the Diocese for apportionment, salary and benefit costs were paid in full by the January 15th, 2004 deadline. However, through out the year, St. Paul's has been in arrears on its funding obligations to the Diocese. In part, this is due to the fact that certain payments, such as Trust Income and the effect of additional giving for Easter and Christmas, are not received evenly during the year.

Better matching of our annual giving to our fixed, monthly expenses must be a focus area again in 2004. One of the ways to address this is to achieve greater participation the Pre Authourized Withdrawal, or "PAW" program. Participation in the PAW program in 2003 was up marginally from 2002 comprising about 32% (2002 – 29%) of identifiable givers.

Although reporting a loss is disappointing, the financial results reported above do not do justice to the huge effort and progress being made building our new church. I choose to look at this shortfall as an investment – an investment in the future made in a year characterized by tremendous change. Change is difficult but it is necessary to achieve the vision we've set for St. Paul in the new facility. I look forward to 2004 and bridging the gap between today and realizing our vision in the new church.

Afternoon Out Program for Seniors

Another exciting and challenging year is in full force for our Seniors Afternoon Out Program, held weekly on Thursdays.

With the construction of the new church underway, the loss of Fr. Lee's involvement, and the loss of the use of a bus, we have been met by some challenging re-organization.

The participants and volunteers have been filling our tables in the hall/church to capacity. (On average we have 15-25 people). It is a cosy atmosphere as we enjoy a short service held by various clergy in the community. This is followed by a wonderful social time. This ministry is truly blessed by many committed volunteers. Each week we have on average 5-10 volunteers, as well as entertainers and speakers, who aid in making this a very special day.

Since its inception, this program has offered to arrange pick-up and delivery for the seniors who need transportation to the church. This year we were not able to continue with the use of a bus to pick the seniors up. We have therefore had to organize the driving ourselves. This has added the need for more volunteers, more organization of the program and more time and responsibility for those involved.

It is our hope that we will be able to have the use of a bus on an ongoing basis. We have attempted to make arrangements with some of the retirement homes for the shared use of a bus, but have not been successful. We did rent a bus for a while, but the cost became too high to continue.

The majority of participants are primarily from 3 Senior Residences within Kanata plus another 5 or so seniors from their own homes.

Our goal for the future is that more of the local Retirement/Nursing Homes will join us in this program and offer their residents the opportunity to come to church with us on Thursdays.

Our hope is to expand this ministry to accommodate a weekly attendance in excess of 50 seniors. With this goal in mind, it will be an absolute necessity to have a bus at our disposal each week.

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Each week we have seen the joy and hope this program has offered to so many wonderful seniors. We know there is this need for Christian fellowship and support for those seniors in our community. We give thanks to God for the opportunity to continue in this ministry. We ask for continued prayer to enable us to reach out and provide fellowship to as many seniors as God has planned for us to meet.

Capital Fundraising Campaign

Following the Campaign Feasibility Study conducted during the latter part of 2002, and the unanimous approval to construct our new building by this Vestry one year ago, a **campaign target of \$800,000** to be solicited from members of the Parish was established as a realistic, doable, and necessary component of the \$2.3 million estimated construction cost. Although actual construction costs received in August 2003 substantially increased the building's projected overall cost, the parish's portion of the campaign target remained unchanged at \$800,000 with other sources of funding intended to make up the difference.

The building of the Campaign Team commenced in March 2003 and has remained an ongoing part of our program to ensure we have sufficient canvassers to complete the task. The Campaign Team is comprises a small executive team, seven canvassing team leaders, and 33 canvassers. I would like to personally thank the executive, the team leads, and all the canvassers for their efforts in a challenging and sometimes uncomfortable role. It seems we Anglicans really would rather not talk about money! I would also like to acknowledge the efforts of many others that have provided various kinds of support to this campaign. In particular, special thanks to Sheldon Mulligan who donated the paper and printing for our campaign literature and stationery, to Harris & Lorraine Kirby for their Cornerstone publishing expertise, and to Betsy Clarke & Associates for her continued leadership and guidance in her consultant role as Campaign Director. Without the efforts of this small but dedicated team, we would not be able to proceed with this program.

Our attempt to keep the Parish and the community informed of campaign progress has taken several avenues. Apart from the monthly Cornerstone bulletin and the Campaign canvassing materials mentioned above, there has been significant linkage initiated by Lewis Kruger with the Kanata Kourier Standard which has resulted in at least 3 community articles on our new building with the promise of more to come.

St. Paul's comprises approximately 410 families. Our campaign goal is to reach each family and offer them the opportunity for a visit from one of the canvassing team and the opportunity to offer a gift to the campaign. As of January 27th, we had recorded/completed 144 donations and pledges totalling over \$430,000 or 54% of our campaign target. This is a significant achievement! But as you can see, we have a substantial way to go yet before we can declare this campaign successful.

At this stage of the campaign, I predict that we will <u>NOT</u> meet our \$800,000 target if we carry on with the same trends. An under-run of \$200,000 or more is not beyond expectation! While we seem to be making significant progress towards our campaign goal, I am frustrated with two aspects of the journey we have experienced thus far. First, we are significantly behind in our ability to complete our visits and calls to all parishioners. An optimistic target schedule to complete all visits by November 2003 evaporated last year and has now been amended to a hopeful completion by end of April 2004. It has taken us 10 months to reach and close on just 144 donations. This is, by anyone's standards, a rather leisurely pace for so important a venture. In my opinion, the direct cause of this lengthened schedule is reluctance by many members of this Parish to step up in sufficient numbers to adequately staff the campaign effort. This was particularly true in the early stages of the campaign where I would personally make a dozen calls before I could fill a position, and I know my team leads have encountered the same

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rejection rate many times since. This is simply unacceptable from a parish that says it is committed to this project.

Second, our average donation and/or pledge per family is currently in the \$3000 range. To reach our target of \$800,000 will require an average gift size of just over \$1400 per family from the 250 families yet to be visited/finalized. This is just not likely to happen since well over 150 of these families currently have no identifiable givings to St. Paul's, and many do not attend or participate in our Church life regularly. Furthermore, it is a fact that we have concentrated our initial canvassing to those in the parish who tend to be most active and have responsibilities of leadership (e.g. Parish Council, Campaign Team, various group co-ordinators, etc). We did this so that we could provide a jump-start to the campaign, demonstrate leadership through personal commitment, and participate in early canvassing (all canvassers must themselves have been canvassed and established a pledge before they in turn may canvass others). It is also a fact that we have been unable to secure any large donations from individual donors, a very unusual occurrence in this type of campaign. With the prospect of declining per family averages, perhaps a significant number of absolute rejections from members who are really not interested in St. Paul's, and a less than stellar average from our primary givers, the writing is on the wall about the potential to reach our target of \$800,000 target.

So, as your campaign chair, I profess to be disappointed in the commitment of this parish in supporting this project. I puzzle as to how our commitment so unanimously and passionately expressed at Vestry just a short year ago somehow seems to have gone on the back burner – not forgotten but not so high up on the priority list either.

While I may be disappointed, **I am not without hope.** My comments above are generalizations, which truly do not apply to all. I have been advised that there have been several truly *sacrificial gifts* to this campaign from people who were not expected to be able to contribute significantly. There are several on my campaign team who continuously give of *their time, their creativity, and their energy* to keep the rest of the campaign team going strong! Now that's commitment! What inspiration that kind of giving and sharing of energy should and can be to the rest of us! What a blessing if we would all just *reset our personal thermometer of commitment a notch higher*.

I invite and urge you to rethink your personal commitment to St. Paul's and our new church home. For this is about you - not your neighbour, not your pew buddy, not your friend – it's about you! To quote a tired but appropriate cliché, *"If you are not part of the solution, then you are part of the problem"*! I am confident that with a renewed level of involvement and giving consistent with our intentions that my next year's campaign report will have a much improved tone – a tone of joy and elation at having reached our committed target of \$800,000, and with God's Grace, exceeding it. We will then have *realized our dream! Praise God!*

Notes:

- 1. Overall building costs increased primarily due to dramatic material and construction labour increases over original estimates. Building activity in and around Ottawa is running "red hot" at the moment with no sign of let up. Consequently tenders received demonstrated higher costs consistent with market "supply and demand".
- 2. Reducing and compromising on some cosmetic facets of the original architect's design achieved substantial improvements in the costs. However, basic building design remains unchanged and no square footage or building functionality has been lost.
- 3. At the October 5th, 2003 Special Vestry meeting, approval was provided by the parish to commit up to \$2.8 million for the construction of the new church.

Gift Certificate Fundraising Program

This year we have been blessed. Shortly after the New Year (2003) while in Farm Boy I noticed that they were offering Gift Certificates on a bulk discount, \$5000 for 5% discount. Then at the request of a parishioner Bulk Barn was approached. They were amenable to a 5% discount on a \$2000 order. These plus the longstanding Loblaws and Gary's Food Basics earned \$9497, up 77% over 2002's \$5363. Of the \$9497, \$7910 was returned to the church to help with general expenses \$7500 and outreach \$410.

For 2004 Parish Council is counting on the \$7500 and wants more. As has been pointed out the potential for this program is about \$48,000 per year. [Calculated as follows: 200 families buy \$400 per month times 12 months at 5% or \$48,000] At present we earn about \$500 in Loblaws per month and \$200 in Gary's Food Basics. We sell about \$1750 per month of Farmboy for a profit of \$87.50. Bulk Barn nets us \$33 per month.

My thanks to the Congregation representatives Larry Barkhouse, Jean Ripley and Sandy Pinhey for their help selling the gift certificates. As well, thanks to Nancy for selling some out of the office.

We all have to eat. What better way to accomplish two things, eat and give to the church at the same time.

Music Director

Refugee Sponsorship Group

Your church is one of seven churches committed to supporting the Kanata/Stittsville Refugee Sponsorship Group (KSRSG) as an outreach ministry. The seven member churches are as follows: Glen Cairn United, Kanata United, St. Andrew's Presbyterian, St John's Anglican South March, St. Paul's Anglican, St. Thomas' Anglican, and Stittsville United. This ecumenical organization was formed in 1996 to sponsor United Nations Convention Refugees from around the globe in order to provide them with a safe haven and the opportunity for a new life in Canada. We wish to update our member churches on the activities that we have undertaken over the past year.

New Committee Director

In January, we welcomed Gwen Ament, Minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Stittsville, to the position of Chair. Gwen has experience working with refugees and has a great interest in this ministry.

KSRSG agreed to four Refugee Sponsorships this year:

An 18 year old woman from Sierra Leone The parents of an Afghan family we previously sponsored A young man from Somalia A family of five from Sudan

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Three of the sponsorships involve little in the way of financial commitments as the sponsored individual will be joining family members already living in Canada. These members will be providing most of the support for both financial and settlement needs.

In June, we were greatly saddened to learn that Canadian Immigration officials were unable to contact the young woman from Sierra Leon for interviews and as a result, her file has been closed as her whereabouts are unknown.

The family from Sudan will be a full sponsorship requiring complete financial and settlement support. This Christian family of five has been forced to flee Sudan and has escaped to Cairo where they are living in dire circumstances. A recent letter from Canadian Immigration officials acknowledged our application and informed us that it typically takes twenty-four months to process an application from Cairo.

We wish to thank our parishes for your ongoing financial support for our work. To date, we have raised about \$18,000 of the estimated \$30-35,000 required to support the family from Sudan.

Arrival in October of a family from Sierra Leone:

A family from Sierra Leon, consisting of an elderly mother, her teenage daughter and the daughter's young child, arrived in Ottawa October 1st. They were sponsored by Kanata United Church, one of the KSRSG members. We received generous donations of clothing and household items from church members. There may be the need to request some specific home care items for the elderly mother who is suffering from post-traumatic stress along with some physical ailments. We will advise the congregations when we have a specific list of what is required. After a short stay in hospital, the mother is now at home and coming along well. Her teenage daughter is enrolled in English as a Second Language classes with hopes of eventually getting into nursing. Her little two year old daughter is tiny from lack of adequate nutrition, but is doing very well. She is a happy little girl who loves the snow and is already picking up English. We are happy to welcome this family into our midst.

Previous Kosovar and Afghan Sponsorships:

Financial support to one of our families from Kosovo with young children, in the form of food coupons, was reduced to \$300.00 a month in January and was ended in September. The father is working forty hours a week in a job that does not pay particularly well but does offer some benefits such as dental and pharmaceutical plans.

The children have settled well and are enjoying school.

The other family has three teenage children who are enjoying and doing well in secondary school. Both parents have found work and are self-supporting.

Our family of five from Afghanistan are entirely self-supporting. These dedicated and talented individuals are continuing to learn English and are working at a few jobs each. One member is hoping to apply to Medical School in the near future, and another to a Masters program at University of Ottawa.

You will be interested to learn that the daughter in the original family that we sponsored from Afghanistan is now a first year student at the University of Toronto.

What else besides Sponsorship?

Since 9/11 we have noticed a real slowdown in the processing of refugee applications resulting in longer waits for the arrival of individuals and families. This has prompted the KSRSG to consider expanding our mandate to include:

1) providing financial support to organizations working with, or in support of refugees, some of who may not be living in refugee camps

2) being a resource for newcomers to the Ottawa area needing furniture and household items. In the coming year, we may put out calls to our parishes for specific items and look forward to your continuing support.

Support for Canadian Council for Refugees (CCR)

In May we agreed to support the Canadian Council for Refugees with a cheque in the amount of \$180.00. We also applied to be registered as full members of the Canadian Council for Refugees for a fee of \$35.00 per year. Our application was accepted.

Link with Catholic Immigration Centre (CIC) - Support for Newcomers

In June we met with two members from Assumption Church in Vanier, and with Julie Salach-Simard, from Catholic Immigration Centre, to discuss the process for providing assistance to new immigrants in Ottawa. The needs of refugee families are assessed by Catholic Immigration and our Group is informed of ways in which we can be of the assistance. Since that meeting we have been able to provide clothing and household items to a mother and her four children from Columbia, and to a family of four young men from Zambia. We have also provided donations to the Sisters of Charity who outfit refugee families referred by Reception House. We thank the members of our congregations for their support in these endeavours.

Link with Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC)

- Ongoing follow-up with Immigration on our sponsorship cases
- Completed surveys by CIC on refugee sponsorship

Link with Canadian Council for Refugees (COR)

- Members of the KSRSG are also members of COR
- Involvement by KSRSG members in a workshop on Sponsorship put on by Coalition in Ottawa for Refugees. COR is sponsoring a workshop in January along with the Canadian Mental Health Association on working with Victims of War and Torture.

Small Group Ministry

In early 2003, a dozen members of the congregation and their children gathered together to begin a journey of discipleship and growth. This was the beginning of another "small group" ministry at St. Paul's, a ministry which we hope will grow enough to welcome every member of the parish.

So what is "small group" ministry? Also called a home group, cell group, or house group, a small group is where a group of Christians, their friends and the curious meet together on a regular basis (weekly or fortnightly) to encourage each other and help each other grow as Christians. It's where church gets personal!

What do we do at a small group? This past year our small group socialized (equals eating...hey, we're Anglicans!), studied the Bible, watched and discussed the "Seize the Day" video series with Tony Campolo, enjoyed a genuine Jewish Sabbath meal and Havdalah (more socializing!), and had a makeyour-own pizza night (more socializing!). Our biggest endeavour was studying the Christian Disciplines with the help of a study guide, during which every member of the group had a chance to lead the group and facilitate discussion.

There are other small groups at St. Paul's: the Sisters in Christ Bible Study group (contact: Victoria Miller) and the Cursillo 4th Day group (contact: Joan Andrews). Any group which meets regularly with the goal of growing in Christ is a "small group".

The biblical basis for small groups: Jesus' method of discipleship was the small group. The small group became the pattern of ministry for the New Testament church. The following passages highlight this model for ministry in the early church where believers worshipped and learned the scripture in their homes:

- "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer... They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved." (Acts 2:42-47 see also Acts 5:42, Acts 20:20)
- "Greet also the church in their house." (Romans 16:5) •
- "Aquila and Prisca, together with the church in their house, greet you warmly in the Lord." (1Cor. 16:19)
- "Give my greetings to the brothers and sisters in Laodicea, and to Nympha and the church in her house." (Col. 4:15)
- "To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker... and to the church in your house:" (Philemon 1-2)

Looking to the future! The effectiveness of small groups as a model for Christian discipleship did not end with the apostolic era. Indeed, we believe in an apostolic church and small groups are the most effective way of extending the ministry that we share on Sundays. During the rapid growth of our congregation after the opening of our new building, small groups will have a crucial role to play in welcoming, nurturing and discipling the new, and existing, members of this parish. Ask any one of the undersigned for more info. Ask their kids too!

Stewardship Committee

The first few meetings were used to pray, get to know each other, and talk out what the stewardship mandate means and how it would play out. Team Demographic wanted on the Stewardship team:

4) Members need to come in with a passion, and a concept of what Stewardship is. The number on the

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Team has not been set. Possibly 6 - 8. More when seasonal things (activities) are needed. People are going to want to know how long of a commitment they are looking at. They need to understand what is in it for them. In giving you receive.

We met with Lynn and supported 'Guess who's coming to dinner?'. We sponsored the 'Reduce, Reuse and Recycle everything' evening. We investigated different aspects of stewardship, including * the Diocesan 'Green book' - "Renewing Our relationship with the Earth", * Energy Efficiency workshops (home maintenance, etc.) * T-NET 'The training network for Disciple-making Churches' * Natural Church Development * Possible Adult education workshops - on prayer, budgeting & tithing, Spiritual Gifts Inventory & ministry, etc.* Living our Baptismal vows workshops.

The volunteer registry for the mandated hours students are required to complete is implemented. "The Haven" Gatherings

Goal: A gathering for youth 13 and over that ensures a safe and respectful place for them to go to develop personal interests and social relationships in the community.

We opened our doors in December however with the change of direction from our neighbouring church our focus was revisited. Team leaders, Faye Roy, Meaghan Kidd, Robert Lavergne, Graham Winn, Laura Gillis, Mike Lavergne, Anne Lee, Anne and Tom Baker, Joy and Jim decided to use the time to reflect on

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our commitment and get acquainted. We did and do have a few youth from our church who were not attending one of the other groups participate, there were also a few drop in community youth.

A consensus amongst the leaders was to keep the group open and functioning while trying to get the word out to youth in Kanata. We decided to keep going. We have found a number of our current youth from both groups attend sometimes while others are committed and still others organize their attendance with their drives or activities. The numbers range from 1 to 7.

Time: Sunday @ 3:30 to 5ish.

Activities: Movies, cards, music, playing and listening, dancing, various art activities including water painting, pastels, colouring, drawing, beading, guitar, keyboard and computer lessons, discussions, debates, chit chat, bad jokes and lots of eating. Yet to come is knitting, cooking more on the computer and a few surprises. We go with the flow and the interests of those attending as well as those participating in leadership, similar to a Montessori school.
