Rector's Report February 2006

"From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked." Luke 12: 48

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I greet you in the love and peace of Jesus Christ. Traditionally the rector's report is a time to reflect on the past and cast a vision for the future. I am amazed at how far we have come in such a short period of time. After such an eventful period in the history of St. Paul's it was enjoyable to just to relax in our new space and begin to see how different it felt. We have been blessed by our new facilities. I enjoyed my sabbatical and realized that God was calling me to continue to work through the challenges that remain at St. Paul's. I believe that the future is fantastic but the journey will be challenging.

A) THANKSGIVING

We need to begin this year with thanksgiving. I would like to thank the parish for their support and commitment in 2005. I thank God for the blessings He has showered on our community. We are a united family that has achieved a high degree of participation, commitment and agreement. This year was filled with change and that is always stressful, but we have adapted beautifully.

I would like to express my personal appreciation to ministry coordinators, the wardens, the treasurer, members of Parish Council, all the committees of the church, and all those individuals, who are responsible for different tasks and events. It is a pleasure to be in partnership with such devout and active Christians. We have many faithful groups who provide prayer support, bible study, outreach, fellowship opportunities, etc. I would to thank Mark Stalter for coming forward to take on the position of Treasurer.

To our out going wardens, Bev Cathcart who has served as Rector's Warden for three years, and Bill Colls who has served as People's Warden for six years, Your faithfulness has been a blessing to the parish during an Era of building and growth. To our Staff: Last year saw the resignation of Marsha Fisher whose energetic personality was hard to replace. Lorna Brule filled the gap and has provided gentle but firm direction to the everyday running of the parish. Faye Lavergne continues to lead the youth initiatives in our parish with joy and confidence. Shirley Mahar coordinates the Sunday school programs with patience and care. Ann Faurbo provides faithful leadership to both our music groups. John Taylor keeps our busy and larger facilities clean and tidy on a shoe string budget.

I have the daily pleasure to work with the faithful and dedicated staff of St. Paul's who constantly give more than they are paid for or asked for.

We have become the third largest (in terms of attendance) parish in the diocese, on a budget that is about the tenth largest. I believe that we are good stewards of the resources that you entrust us with. We need more help to realize the true potential of this parish. Thankfulness is always the beginning for our journey in faith. Once we are aware of our blessing it is important to understand that God normally asks for more.

B) CHALLENGES WE FACE

We need to continue to grow and adapt our structures to meet the needs of our changing family. We need to offer more of our selves to become a more faithful community. We need to offer our time, talents and money to reach a higher degree of faithfulness to our calling. I believe that God wants more of each one of us so that we can meet the needs of our community more effectively.

In Particular, but not in any specific order:

- 1. We need to pray for our church and ministry. We must continue to discern God's will for us.
- 2. We must develop new and effective leaders in the congregation. Redevelop the way Parish Council works to make it more effective for our size.
- 3. We must raise the money to pay off our debts and put more resources into our parish ministries.
- We must create a warm and welcoming worship and fill those who come with an experience of God.
- 5. We must develop more open and intentional communication within the Parish.
- 6. We must make stewardship a central theme of our discipleship.

Many parishes are facing decline and decay while we face growth and expansion. You and I have the privilege of participating in a new and bold adventure. St. Paul's was established and built on the foundations of responding faithfully to the call of God. This year our call remains the same. We must be faithful to that Call.

C) VICTORY ASSURED

Although the task seems large and the resources low we are part of a wider community that tells a reoccurring truth: God is Faithful and blesses our faithfulness to his Will. We are the people of God and we are called to serve Him.

The Wardens Report

It has been an exciting year of change and growth as we settled into our new digs, tried to figure how everything worked, where to put stuff, and what to do next.

Figuring how everything worked has had its interesting moments, but all things considered, we had very few problems, and the problems we did have were relatively minor, and easily put right.

Storage space and its fair distribution is always a problem in a church. Murphy's law applies (the stuff to be stored will expand to fill all available storage space), and with some 60 ministries wanting space there will be always be some degree of pressure.

What to do next is by far the most difficult, interesting and important problem. This past year we had to face up to the fact that we weren't a small church anymore. Of course, we haven't been a small church for some years, but as long as we were in the old buildings, largely operating under our old systems, we were able to continue pretending that we were. That pretense won't fly any more. Walk up Young road, and you know we aren't a small church. Stand by the altar, and look out over the pews, and you know that we aren't a small church. Walk around the classroom space downstairs, and you know we aren't a small church. Look at last year's financial report, and next year's budget, and you know that we aren't a small church. Recognizing the fact is half the battle. Taking action on that fact is the other half.

Perhaps the most difficult part of this transition is simply the change in mind set required. We were helped in getting this adjustment started when Father John started his Sabbatical period in April. The life of the parish was going on apace; problems had to be evaluated, decisions made, and actions taken. So we were forced to initiate the transition from a "priest-led" parish to a "lay-led" parish. If the subject was not pastoral or liturgical, the wardens, now strengthened by the addition of deputies, made decisions, initiated actions, and moved the life of the parish forward. This is still the case: you hear it every time you call the church, get the answering machine, and are directed to the duty warden. More changes in this direction are coming.

In the past year, Parish council has spent considerable time on how it conducts the business of the parish, and you can expect to see changes as it is restructured to ensure that it fairly represents all groups and activities in the Parish. In a larger church, there is a significant need to decentralize decision-making within a broader group of parish leaders to make our operations more efficient. This will require us to provide more focus on leadership development. The payoff will be to allow Parish Council and the Corporation to better address the important, longer-term, strategic issues rather than just day-to-day tactical concerns.

Financially, it was a difficult year. The treasurers' report elsewhere gives all the details. Generally, givings were up substantially. Nevertheless, we failed to meet our full commitment to the diocese, and some other activities were curtailed due to lack of funds. One of the biggest pressures on our resources was the bridge loan and Anglican Foundation interest associated with the money borrowed to build the new building. We are examining possible alternate strategies to make these charges more manageable, but with the grace period for the full amount of our mortgage (\$1.0M) with the diocese expiring at the end of 2005, financial pressures will continue to be a significant fact of our financial life in the parish for some time to come.

We take this opportunity to thank Lorraine Kirby for her hard work as treasurer, and welcome Mark Stalter as he takes up the challenge of managing our finances. In particular, the Corporation extends its thanks to Bill Colls for his willingness and substantial additional effort to undertake the treasurers function on an interim basis until Mark came on board in December 2005.

There have been other changes over the year. We thank Marsha Fisher for her dedication and hard work in the parish office during our transition years, and welcome Lorna Brûlé as she now steps in and takes up the job of Parish Administrator. We thank the hundreds of you, the members of the parish, who have made our 60 plus areas of ministry work so well. Christianity is not a "spectator"

sport" and it is your involvement that makes our parish the vibrant, exciting Christian family that is making our community a better place to live.

Treasurers' Comments

The 2005 financial year began with Lorraine Kirby as your treasurer continuing her commitment from 2004. When circumstances dictated that Lorraine step down, Bill Colls stepped into the role and in December I was asked to take over from Bill. With the assistance of Fr. John, the Wardens, Lorraine Kirby, Bob & Nancy Moxley, Darrell Small and Lorna Brule I was able to quickly understand the system and carry on.

As reflected above St. Paul's will report a loss of \$6,200 for fiscal 2005 representing approximately 2% of the budget approved at Vestry last year.

Looking at Income, the largest variance, (with the exception of Trust Income which we cannot forecast), relates to the shortfall in *Receiptable Income*. We continue to set ourselves a challenging budget based on faith. It is important to not lose sight of the fact that our givings have increased 7% year over year since 2002. The surprise for 2005 relates to the fact that our givings did not sustain during the summer months. This potentially can be attributed to the fact that Fr. John was on Sabbatical during these months, and the continued instability in the high tech sector. Expenses followed the trend of years past by not hitting expectations and in fact was 2% lower than forecasted. The sector most affected by increased spending was under the building category. This expenditure was not unexpected as we still have work do on the exterior of the building to comply with the site plan as filed with the City of Ottawa.

Cash Flow:

The good news regarding this years' results should be recognized. However, the end of the year result conceals significant underlying pressures on cash flow during 2005. On December 31, 2005 we are not in the best of positions. The diocese has not been paid in full, and throughout the year St. Paul's has been in arrears on its funding obligations to the same. All of the church supplier debts however are current.

Better matching of our collective annual giving to the financial pressures we are about to face, will be primary in 2006. One of the vehicles to address this is to achieve greater participation in the Pre Authorized Withdrawal, or PAW program. Participation in the PAW program in 2005 was up from 2004 at approximately 32-35%. Receiptable income from Pre-Authorized Withdrawals was approximately \$87,000 or 40% of total Receiptable income.

For St Paul's church to have the greatest impact, it must make spending decisions with a clear view of the mission of the church. Quality of life, unity and growth are strategic issues that we have identified in the past as being crucial to our mission. Commitment to addressing these areas will impact spending over the coming years.

Reporting a deficit is never an enviable task. We as a parish have faced formidable challenges. The financial results regrettably do not reflect the huge effort and the progress we have made in the building of our new worship space. It is a space to be proud of and I am certain that our commitment to the task will be evident in 2006!

<u>Capital Fundraising Campaign Report</u> Year 2005

It's not over until it's over!

Although the memory of our financial campaign of 2003 and 2004 to raise \$800,000 in capital funds to rebuild St. Paul's may be a distant memory to you, rest assured that we are continuing to exercise the appropriate level of discipline to ensure that funds pledged continue to flow in as committed.

As of December 31st, 2005, our capital campaign statistics are as follows:

Total funds pledged or received \$822,244
Actual funds received / banked \$734,270
% funds banked / total funds 89.3%

We are slightly favourable (approximately +2.8%) regarding expected received / banked funds relative to total funds at year end 2005. This is very encouraging since all funds received early represent an opportunity to pay down bridge loans earlier than anticipated thereby saving us interest charges. Further, we are very pleased to report that we have no current problems with pledges not being honoured as committed. For a campaign of this size, we are indeed fortunate and blessed to have a congregation so fully behind this project. Everyone please take a bow! You have earned it.

I would like to acknowledge the continuing work of Wayne Keech in overseeing our campaign progress, maintaining up to date records, and ensuring post-dated cheques are correctly submitted. The smoothness of this campaign is in no small measure a reflection of the dedication and efficiency of Wayne's database skills and effort.

The finalization of this campaign will not occur until 2007 when that last of our pledges are expected to be honoured and closed out - although the vast majority of outstanding commitments should are expected to be received in 2006.

As mentioned above, with respect to bridge financing, I would like to remind all parishioners that these loans are continuing to attract interest charges. Clearly, any additional campaign gifts from new members, or from existing members above current pledged amounts, will assist in reducing these charges. Similarly, pledged amounts received prior to your promise dates will also help us to defray these charges. I invite you to seriously consider these options as you reflect on your personal stewardship commitments at St. Paul's.

Catering and Kitchen Management

2005 was a year of growth, and adjustment, as we tried to organize ourselves around a much-expanded, and opportunity-laden, kitchen facility.

Catering:

St. Paul's was host to a number of parish-oriented, diocesan conferences/workshops and private outside events requiring catering services from April to December 2005. We catered to:

• 2 funeral receptions

- 1 retirement party off-site
- 6 parish & diocesan conferences/ workshops

The ability to provide a catering ministry depends on having sufficient volunteers to host such events and to undertake the appropriate food purchases, food preparation, serving, and, of course, clean-up. We are fortunate to have a small roster of parishioners who will make and donate food and some who will help set up the room, arrange food and clean up afterwards. Thank you to those persons who have helped this past year when we called upon you. On two occasions because of the shortage of volunteers, several members of the Youth Group helped with serving and clean-up.

All of our events would not have been successful without the specific help of Diane DeRusha and Marg McGowan who agreed to be my assistants shortly after I took over as Co-ordinator. Their ideas and hours spent working in the kitchen have been invaluable. We were also blessed to have two volunteers who cleaned the refrigerators and stoves in September. Looking ahead, I would like to explore the idea of setting up a "Catering/Kitchen Guild" which would see a roster of persons (women and men) be responsible for weekly kitchen clean-up and catering help when needed (similar to the Altar Guild). The viability of expanding the catering ministry beyond current capacity will depend very much on acquiring additional volunteers to complement the current leaders.

The Kitchen:

During 2005, many improvements were made to kitchen equipment and services. Perhaps the most significant was the installation of our professional dishwasher in September. Apart from meeting a Health Department standard for a facility such as St. Paul's, the dishwasher has been invaluable in easing the many hours of dishwashing associated with large food/service events held this fall. Many smaller items to upgrade our kitchen utensils and linens were provided through a kitchen shower held last April. With the proceeds of various catering events, several commercial kitchen appliances such as a rolling cart for dirty dishes and dishwasher racks and caddy were acquired to ease the workload and upgrade our general level of safety.

Organization of the kitchen and its general upkeep continues to be a challenge when so many people use it. However, this is a "good" problem to have, since it shows that we are indeed making good use of God's gifts in doing the work He would have us do within His new church. In the meantime, I am open to suggestions for improvement of kitchen routine and function. In return, I ask for your cooperation in maintaining a high level of cleanliness, tidiness, and following the posted instructions.

Rental and Catering Policy:

The facilities of Rutter Hall, the kitchen, and St. Paul's catering services (as well as other rooms throughout the church) are primarily available to fulfill the various ministries of St. Paul's. However, whenever the facilities are not required for ministry use, they are available to members of St. Paul's for personal events, to other ministerial groups and religious organizations in our community, and to the general public. All such use must be reserved in advance of the event, without exception, through the Church Office. In addition, all use of facilities and services must also be in accordance with St. Paul's Policy on rentals and catering. A copy of the policy and current rental rates may be obtained from the church office or from St. Paul's Web Site at www.stpaulshk.org.

Church School

This has been an exciting time of growth in our new space. The phrase "Build it and they will come" is certainly very appropriate for our Church School. Last year I reported to you that we had 28 teachers and helpers and 34 children. This year I am ecstatic to report to you that we have 37 dedicated teachers and helpers and 78 wonderful children! The children amazingly, are divided evenly between both the 9:15 and 11:00 church schools with 39 students registered in each, with the largest numbers in the age 4-7 classes. Our teachers and helpers work on a rotational basis and that seems to have worked out very well for them. [We are still in need of at least one teacher for our 11:00 classes.]

Our curriculum, which is endorsed by the Anglican Church, is called "Seasons of the Spirit". It is based on the same lectionary readings that the adults hear every Sunday in church. This allows for both parents and children to hear the same message and share their thoughts together about what they have learned.

We have had a wonderful time with two "Special Activity Days" that were held in conjunction with Christ Church Bells Corners, St. Michael and All Angels, Nepean and St. Thomas's in Stittsville. The "Ash Wednesday program" and the "All Saints Day programs" were both big hits with the youth and extremely successful! A day away from school allows all youth from Kindergarten to grade 12 a powerful learning experience where they will explore and celebrate in different Christian Holy Days. They learn more about their own faith and God's love in the world. An event we hope you all enjoyed was our "Choir of Angels" who sang for you on Christmas Eve. They really had a lot of fun with this!

This year we are focusing on an outreach project where we hope to provide a water buffalo for a needy community in the third world. Our plan is to be able to purchase the water buffalo, through World Vision, for Christmas 2006. In this way the children will learn not only about giving but also about other people in the world who live very differently from the way we do in Canada.

With God's grace we look forward to another fun-filled year with the youth of St. Paul's.



GENERAL FUND GIVINGS



GARDEN REPORT

I think the garden budget for 2006 should be around \$5,000.00. Plans are to remove the gritty soil in four areas and purchase good garden soil so that these areas can be planted.

- a) behind the altar at the rear: b) between the steps at the rear c) the kitchen garden
- d) the small median at the rear.

The area between the rear steps will have to be developed. Will this area be planted, will it be "levelled" and a retaining wall installed? Or will be kept in a gravel "utility" area?

We hope to purchase 2 lilac trees, perhaps spiraea, it is hoped that the kitchen garden will be home to some of St. Pauls lilies from the previous site.

Memorial Garden: Lorna B. has taken care of this site to date. She is the one to confirm plans for this space. It is my understanding that the "vision" calls for a paved circle either with stones or perhaps another substance, will this be purchased by members of the congregation with individual bricks or come from the budget? It is hoped to have one or two benches in this area, perhaps even a bird bath, or even a statue. This area also needs further planting, and it is the hope that some or most of these plants will be donated.

I also feel that the north end of the parking lot needs attention. Perhaps some soil to level it off and smooth it out, and it has been suggested some kind of ground cover that is easy maintenance and easy to trim or cut. This area has quite a slope and ground cover was suggested over grass.

The little lawn opposite Fr. John windows will need further grass seeding and more attention in 2006. The plans call for crab apple trees to be planted along the south parking lot; will they be postponed until 2007?

While the gardens on either side of the Ceremonial steps have started, we hope to build a wall on the right side, and both these areas are not completely finished. Both areas in the official plans call for an evergreen.

I am not sure that most of you know that I retired by the Gardening committee a couple of years ago. I have tried to keep people informed of this or that as people told me what's' what. I feel that in 2006 my contribution will be even less than what it has been in the past year.

Gift Certificate Program

For 2005 Parish Council budgeted for \$20,000 and we earned \$10,250. \$9,000 was turned over to the church general revenues with the remaining \$1250 held in the program to ease the cash flow.

For those of you new to St. Paul's we sell gift certificates redeemable at various stores: Loblaws/Independent Grocer, Food Basics, Farm Boy, Bulk Barn and Loeb/Super C.

The potential for this program is huge. Last year we increased our income from \$10,170 to this year's \$10,250. A rather disappointing result; considering the size of the increase in the number of families in the Parish we should be earning much more with this program.

The program generates 5% on sales of Loblaws/Independent, 5% on sales of Food Basics, 5% on sales of Farm Boy, 5% on sales of Bulk Barn and 3% on sales of Loeb/Super C. [Note: the certificates for Loblaws can be used at Your Independent Grocer hence the "Loblaws/Independent", similarly the Loeb certificates can be used at Super C.]

We all have to eat. What better way to accomplish two things, eat and give to the church at the same time.

My thanks to the following people whose time and work selling these certificates make this a joyful ministry for me: Larry Barkhouse (8 a.m.), Jean Ripley (9:15 a.m.), David Dobson (11:00 a.m.) and Lorna Brûlé (in the Office).

GREETERS

The new church building was opened for worship in September, 2004. It was constructed primarily in response to the need to accommodate new parishioners from the continuously growing community of Kanata and the surrounding area. During 2005, it was recognized that we needed someone specifically designated to greet newcomers as they walk through the doors. Part of the response to the need was the formation of a group of Greeters with representatives at each of the Sunday services whose function it is to identify and greet newcomers and to make them feel welcome. There is a new information pamphlet given to the newcomer which includes a registration form to complete if they wish to do so. If you see someone holding this yellow pamphlet you will know they are new to St. Paul's. Please introduce yourself, assist them in anyway and invite them for coffee after the service.

There are now 16 members of the Greeters Ministry with 2 members for each Sunday service. Thank you so much for a job well done. To date there are approximately 60 new people attending St. Paul's. "Well done good and faithful servants."

Finally, the first impression that a newcomer has on his or her first visit to St. Paul's is very important in their determination of whether or not they may wish to return again. Their impression depends to a great extent on whether they are made to feel welcome, loved and respected. The Greeters can only initiate this process. It is the responsibility of every parishioner to be alert to the presence of newcomers and to make a special effort to interact with them and to make them feel welcome to St. Paul's.

It is hoped to recruit a sufficient number of Greeters so that a particular Greeter would have to serve not more than once a month. Greeting is a fun job; you never know who you might meet!!

To that end, parishioners who feel that they could serve in the Greeter's Ministry are asked to contact Cathy Wright at 839-3819.

Kanata Food Cupboard

The Kanata Food Cupboard is a registered charity, run by a community board, to serve the people of Kanata by providing emergency food to families in need.

St. Paul's is one of six church groups working on a weekly rotation to retrieve phone calls from the clients to the Food Cupboard and arrange times for pick-up, to pack and hand out the requested orders, and to deliver the food if necessary. The need for this service continues to grow. Increasing numbers of calls are coming into the Food Cupboard on a daily basis. St. Paul's is answering the challenge. We now have 30 people (up from 27) who regularly volunteer their time to their community through this outreach ministry. We have two additional people who have volunteered to deliver groceries to the clients who are unable to come to the Food Cupboard. We always welcome new volunteers.

If you feel you would be able to volunteer an afternoon or two once every six weeks to retrieve the calls coming into the Food Cupboard and then to enter them into the computer, or should you be

able to help deliver food baskets Tuesday and /or Friday evenings once every six weeks, please contact Carol Fowler at 592-0124. We can all assist our local community by dropping off food items in the bins conveniently placed in all our local grocery stores, or in the bins found in the front hall of the church.

Outreach Vestry Report

"Attempting to make the best use of our resources to serve the needs of our community; locally and globally...."

How can we make best use of our resources: time, people, and money?

We held our first meeting on January 11, 2005. Attendees: Philippa Wilson, Bill Prentice, Carol Fowler, Heather Colls, Laurie Ann Copple, Lynne Williams, Marian Humphreys and Brenda Desrochers. The meeting was announced in the bulletin, leaders of particular groups that have an outreach/fundraising aspect were specifically invited e.g. Youth group, Sunday School, the Women's Group. We looked at St Paul's in relation to the world and in relation to the Anglican Communion. We looked at programs our church is already involved in or that we had connections to e.g. The Kanata Stittsville Refugee Sponsorship Group, The Kanata Food Cupboard, The Diocesan Ministries, Volunteers in Mission. We then looked at the year ahead and considered how best we could place activities throughout the year so that activities might not be competing with each other.

We considered how to raise awareness. Some underlying principles were drawn up at this meeting and had some bearing as the year unfolded.

Outreach is dynamic, new opportunities and more people are called to serve as the year progresses and we have been blessed. Here are some of this year's outreach highlights...

One of our biggest ministries and one from which we have received recognition throughout our local community is **The Kanata Food Cupboard**.

Our stewardship surveys indicated that we needed to reach out to our seniors. In 2000 we did. On Thursday afternoons ably and cheerfully led by Minx Mulhall, her team also arranges transport to enable people to participate in the **Seniors Afternoon out Program**.

Our stewardship surveys also indicated that we needed to reach out to the youth in our community – not just those that attend church. From this **The Haven** came into being. On Saturday nights our church opens its doors to provide a place for our local youth to "hang out".

Carol Fowler represents our church on the **Kanata Stittsville Refugee Sponsorship Group**. We have an ongoing commitment to support this group. In April, St Paul's was able to provide the venue for a fundraising evening that marked the 10th anniversary of the genocide in Rwanda. Major Brent Beardsley, Operations Officer for General Romeo Dallaire came to speak to us about his experience and helped to point out the disparity between our North American lifestyle and that of most of the world.

The congregation of St Paul's financially and prayerfully, assisted members of our parish who participated in **missions overseas**. Last Easter, Rachel Filteau with, other students from Holy Trinity High School, participated in a mission to the Dominican Republic. Meghan Kidd spent her summer vacation in Migori, Kenya helping to look after Aid's orphans. Laurie Ann and Tony Copple also traveled to Kenya to preach and to deliver: bicycles, bibles, blankets.

Our Sunday school sponsors a foster child, **Ajarul Laskar**. Ajarul's photograph is on display on the foyer table. Ajarul lives in India "his father works as a day labourer and his mother does the household chores" he enjoys playing ball, drawing and singing. Bengali literature is his favourite subject at school. Alan Carson corresponds with Ajarul and has prepared a display for us to place in our Sunday school.

As the year began many of you contributed to the **Primates World Relief Development Fund**'s Tsunami relief and as we came to the end of the year, you were again contributing, this time to provide aid to those affected by the Pakistan earthquake. One of the advantages of being Anglican is that we have Anglican dioceses globally. This enables PWRDF to be communicating directly to fellow Anglicans in the midst of their struggle. PWRDF takes advantage of this local knowledge to help communities when they are in need.

On June 4th, our parish participated in "Love Ottawa in Kanata". "a special day when Kanata-area churches express God's love in practical ways to those in our community who could use a helping hand". St Paul's was responsible for organizing the helping hands team who visited people to help with chores; washing windows, gardening, moving furniture, small household repairs. Members of our parish were also involved with the prayer team.

June was also the month where we reached out to help our **Diocesan Community Ministries** in Ottawa. We collected 80 cases of water (80 x 24 bottles) for the people who visit the diocesan shelters: Centre 454 and The Well. Our aim to give people on the streets in the heat of summer, not only clean water to drink but also a vessel that could be refilled. Over the summer, parishioners collected soap and shampoo samples. At our Fall Rummage Sale, clothes were collected and at Christmas some of you donated gifts for the Shelter Christmas parties.

Our Youth traditionally assist the Kanata Food Cupboard on Thanksgiving Sunday and also collect and package Christmas stockings for teenagers in our community.

Many of our parishioners prepared shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child.

On December 25th Laurie Ann and Tony Copple worked with volunteers to provide their **annual Christmas Dinner** for people who may be alone for Christmas. This year 70 people attended.

Thank you to all of you who contributed to our community, locally and globally.

Who Are We?

7 Member Churches: Kanata United Church, St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Glen Cairn United Church, St. Thomas Anglican Church, Stittsville United Church, St. Paul's Anglican Church and St. John's Anglican Church sponsor United Nations Convention refugees from around the globe to provide assistance in their current country of residence, to provide them with a safe haven and the opportunity for a new life in Canada and to provide settlement assistance for refugees already in Canada

What Is Sponsorship?

Financial support of sponsored individuals for their first year in Canada

Providing contacts for sponsored individuals: housing, education, employment, cultural integration, friendships

What's Happening Now?

Full sponsorship of a single Burmese man of Karen ethnic origin, currently living in a refugee camp in Thailand. He has been in the camp since his family fled the military regime in Burma in 1997. He is expected to arrive in early 2006.

Ongoing support of orphans of the Rwandan genocide.

Where Do KSRSG Dollars Go?

In 2005:

- \$4,700 to support four young people orphaned during the 1994 genocide in Rwanda

Stewardship

Stewardship in 2005 at St. Paul's followed up with the leaders meeting in December of 2004 with a meeting that pursued where God might be calling the community. Many ministry leaders met on January 18th and then again on February 12th to prepare for Vestry. Extensive minutes were taken with many tremendous suggestions and even more unanswered questions. The leaders felt that meeting together on occasion to share experiences and knowledge would be a good investment in time. We held discussions on leadership in general, shared vs. solo leadership, how various ministries were led, Father John, wardens and Parish Council leadership. We also talked about ministry vision, growth, ministry visibility in the church community, job descriptions and training/education needs and how the ministries are supported in the church.

One huge area of concern was the multi-faceted and often uncoordinated communication within the church.

A second concern (as someone observed) was that there is no official link from Parish Council to many of the Ministries. Where is our help from Parish Council? What does Parish Council do? Where is the accountability of Parish Council to the Ministries, and coming to us? Can we go to Parish Council and ask for things? Why are so few of the Ministry leaders on Parish Council (other than those in PC elected roles)? No one has expectations linked to their ministry or knows of links between Parish Council and Ministry Leaders. Who can help them? Accountability - many don't know who they are accountable to.

Two motions were developed and brought to Vestry. (Exact wording can be found in Vestry minutes of 2005)

- * That Parish Council seek and appoint a communications leader to assess, improve and manage the information flow in St. Paul's.
- * That Parish Council assess the linking to and organization of Parish Ministries, make necessary changes and implement.

Stewardship team, with a few ministry leaders, presented a powerful message that God is using our ministries to impact people's lives in dramatic ways.

After Vestry, we got involved in an adult education workshop called SHAPE that was a derivative from 'The Purpose Driven Life" book study taken up by parishioners in late 2004. The workshop was 6 weeks, designed to help people uncover their Spiritual Gifts, Heart (passion), Abilities, Personality and Experiences that have 'shaped' them to be in specific ministries. This was a tremendous success.

A post-mortem of that workshop led to discussions on how to engage more parishioners to this idea of 'called to ministry'. The discussion evolved to how do we welcome newcomers and help them become part of our family. We accepted a challenge to establish a newcomers committee to look this opportunity. We met a number of times over the spring and summer and handed off recommendations to the corporation and Father John in August. You have seen many initiatives that came out of this work - greeters table at the entrance, newcomers lunch and so on.

For many reasons, I felt compelled to, and subsequently did, resign as chair of the Stewardship Committee at the end of July but completed the Newcomers Committee task as promised.

I thank the team members for their dedicated service and support.

Youth

Change is a constant that we respond to with the ever-changing requirements of the youth in our church and community.

Well into my third season here with you at St. Paul's my role with the youth has changed 3 times. Currently I am the Youth Coordinator directly involved in putting together the plans and focus of each of our 4 distinct areas in which the youth are involved"

- Volunteering
- Jr. Youth Group
- Sr. Youth Group
- And the Haven

All four of these are independent of one another, yet they overlap from time to time.

Responsibility for leadership is distributed as follows:

- Amy Bridges coordinates the Jr. Youth group with support from Mike Sorfleet, Alanna Kidd, Fred Prentice, Joshua Bridges and Mark Gilroy.
- Meaghan Kidd coordinates the Haven with support form myself, Graham Winn, Shelley McLaughlin, Deb Turnbull and sometimes from Mike Sorfleet and Liz Brule with special appearances by Joseph Bridges.
- Supporting the coordinators and meeting with the volunteer leaders, setting up
 the volunteers in the right direction and the Sr. Youth group are my areas of
 coordination. Deb Turnbull, Emily Beckett and Meaghan Kidd are my team.

Most of the youth have been involved in some or all of the 4 areas. Like you and me they have their preferences and we try to respect their boundaries – hence the constant motion of change. We try to hear what they want and respond to suggestions.

When I started at St. Paul's, there were 2 groups and 5 leaders with approximately 15 irregular participants. Now there are 4 groups and 13 or more volunteer leaders. The youth involvement fluctuates from 8 to 34 or more depending on the event or night. Currently, the Haven is having the most consistent participation and growth from the community youth. Volunteering to get recognition from the school programs is quite popular, especially with the peripheral youth who are involved with a number of outside structured programs. The youth group participation seems to be the most inconsistent.

Our youth are not programmed and every so often I try to program in order to fit things into some order. You can be sure they let me know and I quickly go back to my knees and ask God to help me draw from his wisdom on what to do next.

Every few weeks we here of a tragedy in one of their schools and or in the world and we try to help them make sense of it. We do missions work and support those who are called to go on mission trips like Meaghan Kidd and Rachel Filteau. The 30-hour famine is always a big hit drawing close to 40 teens. They like overnights and usually there are close to 30 or more participants. My sense is that many of our youth have structure time all week when they come here they want freedom to be and express themselves and challenge their faith in unique and playful ways.

Working largely in conjunction with the Senior Youth Group team, this year has been a building year in terms of coordination, organization, and programming. Under the co-ordination of Faye Lavergne, the youth group has strived to meet the needs of the larger church and our members.

The members of the youth group have also changed drastically. Most of last years members graduated to the Senior Youth Group this past year, so we have had the privilege of getting to know a whole new group of youth. The energy, integrity, and ingenuity of this group of children are a constant inspiration to me and the other leaders. Under the direction of one of the youth, the Junior and Senior Youth Groups have undertaken to sponsor an orphan, Ivon, from Kenya. In this interest, a Cake Walk was held on Sunday, 29 January 2006 (thank you for your generous support) and future fundraisers are planned to support this ministry. Other activities accomplished thus far have included helping with the bazaar, running a penny drive, making crafts for the Senior's Afternoon Out participants, and filling Christmas stockings for the Kanata Food Cupboard. In terms of education, the youth group has undertaken to investigate elements of the liturgy, Anglican doctrine, and the theology of missions. The group is very ambitious and many activities, outings, and events are in the works to finish the year with a flurry of excitement.
