A message from Father Stephen

What a Pleasure!

Back in the 1980s, a character named Enid Strict enjoyed a few seasons of fame on the sketch comedy show *Saturday Night Live*. Enid was played by the actor Dana Carvey, and was better known as the Church Lady. What made her fa-

mous was playing on a common stereotype of Christian churchgoers: the up-tight sourpuss.

Enid appeared in comedy sketches where she interviewed popular figures and grilled them on their apparent sins. One of her catch phrases, usually delivered after someone describes doing something fun, was "I wonder who encouraged you to do that.... Who could it be? Was it Satan?" The catch phrase was effective because it reminded people of Christians who found it hard to believe that pleasure could be something good. Instead, everything that hints of sensuality – even vacations, good food, or cardplaying – must have something sinful about it.

Of course, the comedy routine portrayed an outrageous stereotype, but it worked with the audience because it came with a grain of truth to it. In the past, Christians have sometimes warned that sensuality would inevitably lead to lust, gluttony, or pride. Today, we seem less quick to judge pleasures as inherently sinful. In fact, we often have a hard time even mentioning sin. It's strange then, that so many of us still feel guilty whenever we take time for ourselves. For me, this seems most obvious when I consider how hard it is for people to unplug from their



phones.

Unlike the days when I began my ministry, today every clergyperson I know carries a cell phone with them at all times. Whether it's on a day off, or when out for supper with our spouse, or on a hike in the Gatineau hills, we now make ourselves constantly available for answering emails, texts, and calls. We're not alone in this. Countless professions now expect 24-hour access to clients and employees as part of their job description. Even in our personal lives, the phone sits on the table while we chat with friends – indicating we're ready to have our pleasant conversation interrupted if someone else wants to contact us.

This situation is now so engrained in modern life that we don't recognize how strange it is. Why is it that we feel unable to carve out time to enjoy simple pleasures? Why are we so willing to sacrifice these things as soon as something else comes up? Perhaps the reason is that while we may no longer think pleasure is sinful, we no longer find it useful either.

A client email, a news update, or a text from a friend all give the appearance of importance and urgency. Someone needs us! Our opinion is required! These things make us feel useful and important. They make us feel that we really matter and that we have some control over our lives. Contrast this with the simple pleasure of curling up with a good book on a rainy day. It's pleasant, but it doesn't do much to puff up our sense of importance or control. However, Christians should value pleasure for that very reason: because enjoying a pleasure helps us stop thinking about ourselves at all.

We can tell that genuine pleasures are a gift from God because they have a special ability to pull us out of ourselves and to focus on greater things. When we read a good book just because it's good, we find that we have forgotten ourselves while we read it. Time passes, but we don't notice. The entire question of our usefulness and value isn't even considered. Instead, we just enjoy something for its own sake.

That state of being is exactly why the psalmist (16:11)

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says of God that, "in your presence there is fullness of joy; in your right hand are pleasures for evermore." God's presence is a pleasure which draws us to look at Him, instead of dwelling on ourselves. In this way, all true pleasures have a way of helping us understand what God is like – someone whose whole being leads us into joy.

Of course, it is true that pleasure can be corrupted by the devil. Pursuit of pleasure can lead people to overeat, to use pornography, or to neglect one's duties to others. These are things we must guard against. Yet at heart, the pleasure isn't the problem. It's that the devil directs it to the wrong place, or to the wrong degree, or to take precedence over our duties. The answer to this is not to avoid pleasures, but to be honest and careful in our pursuit of them.

The summer provides us with a great opportunity to use pleasure in ways that bring us closer to God, and to pull us out of self-centredness. One obvious way is to use our vacation time to enjoy the beauty of His creation. Whether it's by sitting by the lakeshore, or taking a walk through the forest with our children, why not use that time to put away everything that makes you feel useful? Turn off your phone, stop thinking about what emails you need to write when you're back at work, and let yourself enjoy the things you had no hand in creating. Enjoy the lake God made, the children God gave you, and the fresh air He made to blow through the trees. Let these things remind you that everything you are able to do, you do because God has blessed you with abilities and tasks.

He loves you! He wants you to enjoy what He made, and for you to enjoy being you — without having to ask yourself if you have worth and value. After all, His death on the cross for you has answered that once and for all. You matter enough to have Him sacrifice His own life for you, so you don't need to pursue usefulness to prove that worth to yourself. Instead, take the time you get this summer to let Him remind you of His goodness and of the goodness of the world He has made for us to live in. I think that if you do, you will return this fall with an even deeper sense that you matter, and an even better sense of worth.

The Importance of a Will

Note: The following article on having a will is an ongoing part of the Stewardship Education and Awareness Program here at St. Paul's.

The Importance of a Will

A will is a written, legal document that communicates your wishes after death. It outlines how your assets and property should be distributed and may include personal instructions such as funeral preferences, guardianship of children, and charitable giving. Despite its importance, nearly half of Canadians do not have a will.

Making a will is a vital act of planning. It protects your loved ones from unnecessary legal complications and emotional strain and ensures that your intentions are clearly understood and carried out. Without a will, those left behind are often forced to make difficult decisions during a time of grief.

Your Will as a Stewardship Tool

As we've learned through our stewardship education,

biblical stewardship involves managing all that God has entrusted to us: our time, talents, and treasures. This calling doesn't end with our final breath. In fact, one of the most impactful acts of stewardship is preparing for what happens to our resources when we are no longer here.

A will is not only a legal document, it is a deeply spiritual tool. It allows us to ensure our material blessings are used in ways that reflect our values and faith. The Apostle Paul wrote, *"It is required of stewards that they be found faithful"* (1 Corinthians 4:2). That faithfulness includes preparing for how we leave behind what God has given us.

By creating a will, we take intentional steps to manage

our estate in a way that aligns with our Christian commitment. This is one more way to be faithful stewards – not just in life, but also in legacy.

Guardianship for Your Children

If you are a parent of minor children, your will is the best way to name guardians who would care for them in your absence. This ensures they are raised in a loving, stable, and faith-filled environment. Without this provision, the courts may decide who will raise your children, possibly in ways that don't reflect your values.


> Establishing guardianship is one of the most important and caring decisions a parent can make. It offers reassurance to you and protection for your children should the unthinkable happen.

> A will should be reviewed every three to five years, or after significant life events such as marriage, the birth of a child, the purchase of property, or the loss of a loved one. It is a living document that should change as your life does.

Choosing the Right Executor

Equally important in your will is naming an executor. This person is responsible for carrying out your instructions, settling debts, and distributing your estate according to your wishes. Selecting the right executor ensures your legacy is honored and your affairs are handled responsibly.

Choose someone who is trustworthy, organized, and ideally familiar with your values and priorities. This might be a spouse, adult child, close friend, or professional advisor. For more complex estates, a lawyer or trust company may be a better choice. Be sure to ask for their consent before naming them and consider appointing an alternate executor in case your first *(Continued on page 5)*



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choice is unavailable. Your executor is a final steward on your behalf — someone who ensures your voice is heard even after you are gone.

Dying Without a Will

If you die without a will – referred to as dying "intestate" – the government decides how your estate is distributed based on provincial laws. This process can be time-consuming, expensive, and impersonal. Often, it results in outcomes that don't align with your wishes – particularly when it comes to charitable giving or support for extended family members.

When no will exists, disputes are more likely to arise among loved ones, and legal proceedings can become a source of added grief. A well-written will brings peace and clarity, allowing your loved ones to grieve without being burdened by uncertainty and conflict.

Legacy Giving through Your Will

Your will is also a powerful tool for legacy giving. Many Christians designate a portion of their estate to support the ongoing work of the church, ministries, or charitable organizations that reflect their values. These gifts extend your stewardship beyond your lifetime, allowing you to continue participating in God's mission even after you've gone home to Him.

As shared in the <u>May</u> and <u>June 2024</u> editions of the Cornerstone newsletter, there are many ways to include your church and other causes in your estate plan. Whether large or small, these gifts make a lasting impact and offer a meaningful expression of gratitude to God.

Do It Yourself or Use a Lawyer

In Canada, it is legal to write your own will – particularly if it is handwritten, signed, and dated. While this is an option, using a lawyer is strongly recommended. Lawyers ensure your will is legally valid, clearly written, and customized to your needs, especially if your estate is complex or involves charitable giving.

Poorly-written or vague wills often lead to confusion, legal challenges, and unintended consequences. A lawyer can help prevent these issues and offer guidance on topics you may not have considered — like setting up trusts for children, or managing life insurance and real estate.

Once your will is complete, keep it in a safe place (such as a fireproof box or safety deposit box) and ensure your executor knows where it is stored. Most lawyers retain a signed original and can provide certified copies for your records.

Final Thoughts

A will offers peace of mind for both you and your family. It is a way to care for those you love, protect your children, and affirm your values. As Christians, it also reflects our desire to be faithful stewards of everything God has given us — even after our earthly life ends.

By preparing a will, you provide clarity, prevent conflict, and secure your legacy. You demonstrate love, responsibility, and commitment to God's purposes in a lasting way. It is never too early – or too late – to begin this important part of your faith journey.

A Letter of Thanks

Dear Fr. Steve and St. Paul's Leadership Team,

I understand that many churches today are evaluating the effectiveness of their outreach beyond their physical buildings.

I am writing to share my personal experience as someone who has greatly benefited from St. Paul's outreach, particularly during a very challenging period.

While I am not a member of St. Paul's, I belong to an Anglican church in the Diocese that does not offer online services, my connection to St. Paul's includes my daughter's Confirmation there and my involvement with Ray Brule and the Alpha program many years ago.

I wanted to provide some important context regarding the impact of your online ministry on my family.

From the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, my family faced significant isolation. My wife has Lupus, and we were explicitly instructed by medical professionals that we needed to remain in strict isolation to protect her health. Adding to these difficulties, I lost my job during the pandemic. As the sole income earner, our family's financial resources dwindled over several years of unemployment. Tragically, we also experienced the loss of a parent during this time.

Throughout this prolonged period of isolation, financial hardship, and grief, I leaned heavily on the online services provided by St. Paul's. I regularly watched your Sunday services and occasionally the Wednesday Bible Study.

It is through this consistent and accessible outreach that I was able to remain spiritually fulfilled and maintain a sense of hope despite the numerous setbacks my family and I faced. Your online ministry became a vital lifeline for me during a time when physical connection and traditional church attendance were impossible.

Thank you for your commitment to outreach and for making such a profound difference in my life during a very difficult chapter. Your efforts extended far beyond the walls of your church and provided muchneeded spiritual sustenance.

For anyone who knows me well, Altar Guild would be the last ministry they would expect me to be involved in. My house is often in various states of chaos, I don't appreciate a well-set table, and it is entirely possible that before joining the Altar Guild I hadn't ironed more than a handful of times in my life, choosing instead every possible gimmick to remove wrinkles, or asking my husband Jeremy to do any of our family's ironing.

Despite this apparent poor fit, I joined looking for a way my family could serve together, and it has been a great opportunity to expose my children to more of the life of the church. But bevond the benefit it has for



my family, I have grown by stepping out of my comfort zone. I have come to love the silence of the empty church. Far removed from the unending to-do list at home, the stillness of the church brings me closer to God. As I see the dirt in the vacuum or dust coming off a surface that didn't appear to need dusting (to my very mess-tolerant eye), I am reminded of the work that God continues in my life even when things look mostly OK. As I carefully set the altar, I am growing to appreciate how participating in this beauty can increase my reverence and can help create a more meaningful experience for worshipping parishioners.

Initially, I was worried that I wouldn't have the skills or the time to serve as part of this important ministry, but I have found that the time commitment is quite small and is flexible to fit within my schedule. And while my ironing likely doesn't match that of more experienced members of the guild, I believe that God recognizes my diligence and effort, and I am confident that the liturgy will be effective, even if some small wrinkles remain.


Wednesday Bible Study

2025. The church is blessed by the gifts we give in any form. Thank you for your ongoing generosity.


